ALBERT THOMPSON, Postmaster. Office Hours from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Money Orders and Savings Bank Business transacted during office hours. Letters within the Dominion and to the United States and Mexico, Great Britain and all parts of the British Empire, cents per ounce or fraction thereof. In reply to the postage necessary, each letter must have affixed a one-cent "tax" stamp. To other countries, 5 cents for the first ounce, and 3 cents for each additional ounce. Letters to which 5-cent rate applies do not require the "tax" stamp.

Post Cards one cent each to any address in Canada, United States and Mexico. Post cards must have a one-cent "tax" stamp affixed, or a two-cent card be used. Post cards two cents each to other countries. The two-cent cards do not require the "tax" stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals, to any address in Canada, United States and Mexico, one cent per four ounces.

All matter for registration must be post-paid an hour previous to the closing of the mail.

PARCELS FOR THE FRONT

Post Office Department, Ottawa, Canada. The Honourable T. Chase Casgrain, Postmaster General of Canada, has been successful, as a result of negotiations entered into with the Imperial Postal Authorities, in effecting an arrangement with the British Government whereby parcels from Canada for Canadian soldiers in France and Flanders will be carried at the same rate of postage as applied to parcels from the United Kingdom for the Expeditionary Forces on the Continent that is.

For parcels weighing up to three pounds, 24c. For parcels weighing over three pounds and not more than seven pounds, 32c. For parcels weighing over seven pounds and not more than eleven pounds, 38c. This means a material reduction on the cost of parcels, and it is hoped it will be a source of satisfaction to the Canadian public. This reduction has been brought about by Canada forgoing all postal charges for the conveyance of these parcels in Canada and on the Atlantic.

The public are reminded, however, in accordance with the circular issued by the Department recently, that until further notice, no parcel can be sent weighing over seven pounds.

BRITISH CRITICS OF PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

London, Dec. 11.—The approval with which President Wilson's recommendations for increased military preparation are received here, reflects complete appreciation and sympathy with his difficult position. Nevertheless, when he says "we have no part or interest in the policies which seem to have brought on the conflict," the very general comment here is that he shows imperfect realization of the position.

The contrary view, which I have encountered repeatedly here in comments on the message, is that the Allies are not fighting for a policy, but against policy and for an ideal—an ideal, moreover, which Mr. Wilson claims for America herself. The Morning Post remarks: "Man, who was created in God's image, is to be recreated by Germany in the image of Germany. Such is the German doctrine, and the first phase in the creation is murder, and sudden death." With the present concrete evidence of German methods in your midst, it is considered that Mr. Wilson should give greater credit to the motives of the Allies; for unless Germany has reconstructed the ideals of the American population, Europe is now fighting for principles of freedom and civilization which are equally important to America.

Although the United Kingdom is the greatest fish-producing country of the world, Canada is at the present time exporting fish to the Old Country. This, of course, is owing to the war. Many travelers have been taken by the Admiralty that the normal catch of fish has been greatly reduced—it is said as much as 60 per cent. Fish forms such a staple article of diet in Great Britain that this unwanted shortage is very serious. Under these circumstances, Mr. Bonar Law, the Colonial Secretary, appealed to Canada to come to the rescue, and a sample shipment has been sent over in the hope of developing a market for Canadian fish in London, at least for the duration of the war. Part of the shipment was fresh, frozen, fish, but the greater portion was smoked and prepared. If the experiment proves a success, this consignment will not doubt be the forerunner of many more and larger cargoes. It is even possible that a market may be thus established for certain kinds of high-grade fish which will remain after peace is concluded, and become a permanent item in Canadian commerce with the Motherland.—Conservation Bulletin.

OBITUARY
