"That there shall be a standing committee of the House to be designated The Committee of Public Accounts' for the examination of the accounts show ing the appropriation of the sums granted by the Legislature to meet the Public Expenditure, and of all other accounts showing expenditures from pub lic moneys for any purpose to consist of seven members who shall be appointed at the commencement of every session and of whom three shall be a quorum."
