

PROSPECTS ARE GOOD FOR RUGBY SEASON AT COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE

Old Players Are Available, and New Blood Is Also on Hand—Officers and Executive Elected Yesterday

The re-opening of the Collegiate Institute for the fall term had seen once more a revival of interest in athletics in general throughout the city, and in Rugby football in particular. The first meeting of the season took place yesterday afternoon at the Collegiate Institute, when the officers of the school rugby team were elected for the ensuing year. The attendance at the meeting was gratifyingly large, and practically every form in the school was represented, presaging the interest which is to be taken in sport by all. The post of honorary president was once more conferred by unanimous vote upon Mr. A. W. Burt, principal of the Collegiate Institute, who replied with a brief and fitting address, thanking all for the honor conferred upon him, and extending the hope of high success for all branches of athletics throughout the school. In the past, the B.C.I. had turned out some excellent Rugby teams, notably that of three years ago, which carried off the trophy in the league. Basketball teams from the school had more than once become champions, and Mr. Burt urged a whole-hearted entry on the part of the entire school into athletics in general, making a plea for better attendance and more entries for the annual field day to be held on the first Friday of October. In place of taking place at Agricultural Park, this event will this year be held upon the Collegiate campus, in case it is ready for use in time.

The line-up of the Collegiate team will be practically the same as that of last year, with the addition of several newcomers who will undoubtedly prove decided acquisitions to the school. Of the old players, the following are still on deck: Moffatt, Deagle, Buckborough, Kelly, Phelps, Baker, Truss, Littler, Hurley, Sweet, Guenther.

In addition to these, the team will be greatly strengthened by the addition of Harry Waddington, who has returned from his position at the Y. M. C. A. at Chatham, and is expected to be in the team in the fall. Another recruit to the field is Vanderburgh, who hails from Guelph and who gives promise of great things. Yet another acquisition is added in the person of Mr. W. Green, the new science master of the Collegiate, who is spoken of as a Rugby player of very high ability, and who has consented to aid the team in any way which may lie within his power. Thus manned, the B. C. I. team should be prepared to give a hard fight to opponents of the highest calibre.

Owing to the disbandment of the Ontario Rugby Football Union, organized Rugby among the high schools of Ontario is, at present, in a disorganized state, but it is generally expected that Guelph and Galt will agree to enter a league such as that existing in former years between the three cities, and that the sport will be kept alive despite the war and all other adverse conditions. No time has been lost in getting down to business, as the first week of school has seen the election of officers and the first practice is being held this afternoon. The executive committee meets on Monday evening.

LOCAL EXPERT GIVES ADVICE

The manager of the local Battery Service Station in this city says that batteries are often blamed unjustly. "In a very interesting booklet recently issued by The Willard Company, the fact is brought out that a storage battery goes dead either because it has not been regularly filled with distilled water or the owner has neglected to keep it fully charged either by running the car or having it charged from an outside source.

"Once in a while a starved condition of a battery may be due to poor generator adjustment or to a material increase in the lamp load. If longer the generator is unable to supply current to the battery as fast as it is taken out, or if the owner does not run his car enough in the day time to give the generator a chance to restore the current used by night driving, his battery is bound to show the effect. This can be remedied, however, by a long charge at a low rate after testing the cells with a hydrometer to determine their specific gravity.

"Any Service Station will make this test free of charge and will furnish a copy of the booklet, 'Are You Starving Your Storage Battery,' which covers the subject in greater detail."

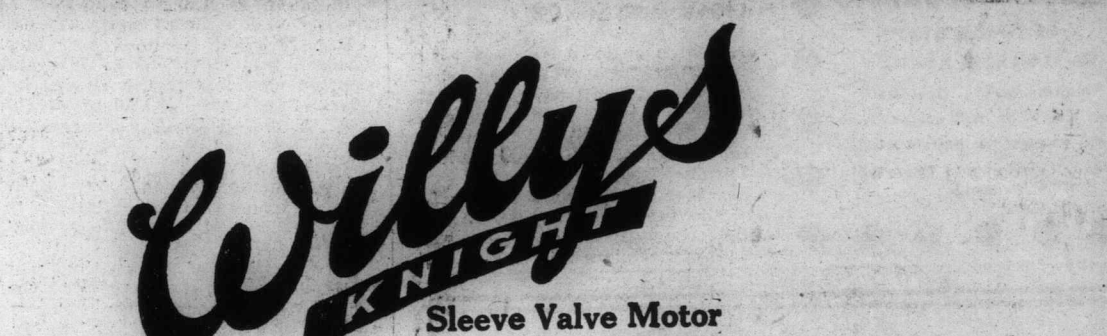

RECORD OF SIXTY CONGRESS

Main Items Were

National Defense
tions For All
Tremendous Fig

Washington, Sept. 9.—(Congress Review)—The first session of the Sixty-fourth Congress which adjourned yesterday, was concerned chiefly with national defense.

When the gavel fell Congress had directed reorganization and reequipping of the Army and Navy for defense of the country at the unprecedented cost of \$655,000,000 with authorizations that will increase the total in three years to nearly \$800,000,000. With all other expenditures, appropriations were brought to the grand total of \$1,637,533,683, the greatest aggregate in the country's history and exceeding that for the last fiscal year by more than half a billion dollars.

Expenditures, necessitated by preparedness and the calling into action of military forces to meet the Mexican emergency demanded recent legislation in the closing days of the session. Congress responded by doubling the normal tax on income, creating an inheritance tax, mutations tax and miscellaneous excises to raise \$205,000,000 and directing sale of \$130,000,000 Panama Canal bonds.

Congress established a Tariff Commission; a Government Shipping Board to rehabilitate the American merchant marine; a Workmen's Compensation Commission to administer a new uniform compensation law; a Farm Loan banking system; Child Labor Law; enlarged the system of self-government in the Philippines and enacted many other important laws which had been contemplated by the administration.

The session was disturbed throughout by frequently recurring threats of foreign complications from the European war and imminence at the time of a diplomatic break with Germany; interference with American mails and commerce; American soil and killing of Americans by Mexican bandits, and danger of actual war with Mexico.

Later in the session troubles arose in the Senate over the nomination of Louis D. Brandeis, of Boston, to succeed the late Justice Lamar as member of the Supreme Court. Weeks of investigation and deliberation by the Judiciary committee ended in confirmation of Mr. Brandeis by a large majority.

Most important legislative enactments of the session, excluding laws for national defense, included the following:
Government Ship Law—Appropriating \$50,000,000 to operate ships, foreign and coastwise trade when unable to lease them to individuals, private corporations.
Child Labor Law—Denying interstate commerce to products of mills and quarries, employing children under 16 years of age and factories, mills, canneries and other establishments employing children under years.

Rural Credits Law—Establishing a Farm Loan Board in control of system of Farm Loan Mortgage Banks.
Workmen's Compensation Law—Providing uniform sick and accident benefits for employees of the Federal Government, and benefits in dependent cases of death.
Emergency Revenue Law—Providing for doubling the normal income tax on lowest class; making an additional surtax ranging from one cent on that portion of income exceeding \$20,000 to 18 per cent on amount of incomes in excess of \$100,000; levying a graduated tax one to ten per cent on inheritance ranging from \$50,000 to \$5,000, a ten per cent net profit tax on manufacturers of munitions, five per cent not profit tax on manufacturer materials entering into munition license tax on actually invested stock of corporations capital at more than \$99,000; wine, and liquor excise taxes and miscellaneous stamp taxes.
