Railway Traffic Earnings—Montreal—Traffic earnings of the three principal Canadian railways for the third week of September aggregated \$8,070,512, an increase of \$254,842, or 3.3 per cent. as compared with a decrease of 4 per cent. for the third week in August, and a gain of 11.4 per cent. for the third week in July.

While each week in August showed a decrease as against the previous years, each week to date in September has shown an increase. The past week is the first since the third week in July to show an increase for all the three roads.

Oil and Gasoline Prices Soon to be Announced—Washington—With the final report of the Federal Trade Commission before him, the President is expected to issue a statement within a few days fixing the prices of oil and gasoline. The figures to be announced will be grouped according to geographical divisions. The figures recommended by the Commission, based upon production costs, are slightly below the present market prices, according to reports here.

Kerr Lake's Income Increased \$22,256—At the annual meeting of the Kerr Lake Mining Company, Limited, a report was submitted showing net profits of \$1,343,474 as against \$813,702 in the previous year. In dividend there were paid, \$668,000, compared with \$672,000 in 1916. The company's cash on hand amounted to \$658,231, and its total assets and liabilities to \$1,475,248.

FIX PRICE OF MILK

A copy of the request that has been issued from the office of the Food Controller to the milk dealers in Ontario, that no advance in price be made until the report of the committee appointed to investigate the situation, has been made, was received by Mayor Bibbly this morning. Copies have been mailed to the local dealers:

All milk producers and all wholesale and retail dealers in Canada engaged in the supply of fresh milk for daily consumption are earnestly requested to make no advance in price for milk obtained in their district on September first, until the committee appointed to deal with the milk prices and prices have reported on what action, if any, should be taken.

It is expected the committee will begin sittings during the week of September 24th, and should be in a position to report by November 4th. Before a just basis for cost of milk production can be arrived at, the effect on prices of this year's crop of coarse grain in Canada and the United States must be ascertained. Reports indicate that the total production of coarse grain will be above the average, the effect of this on the prices of cattle feeds, however, cannot be properly estimated at this time, because the effect of the new crop needs must be ascertained before any action may be determined, therefore it is deemed advisable that any change in prices by producers and dealers be held in abeyance until after October 31st. It is confidently expected that this very reasonable request will be complied with as it will entail little hardship and will make unnecessary the adoption of drastic measures.
