NORWOOD CHEESE FACTORY.

The following is a statement of the business done at the Norwood cheese factory:-Total amount of milk delivered at the factory 1,952,869 lbs. Number of standards 651. Number of pounds of cheese made 175,739. Number of pounds of milk required to make one pound of cheese 11.10. Amount received from sale of cheese \$17,414.88. Value of whey at 40c per standard \$200.40. Interest received on deposits in bank \$609.93. Total money received \$17,725.21. Cost of making cheese \$2,636.12. Total value of milk per standard \$27.37.

BLAIRTON PRESENTATION.

To Mr. J. L. AUGER.
