

## PROVINCE NEEDS A REFORMATORY

JUDGE NEWLANDS' COMMENTS  
ON LACK OF INSTITUTION—  
MCLEAN CROSSING CASE

From Saturday Morning's Leader.  
Judge Newlands had before him a Regina yesterday, Joseph Breckinridge, of only 11 years of age, who pleaded guilty to a couple of thefts in Weyburn a month ago. In sending the boy to gaol for three months, his lordship told Mr. Bigelow who represented the Crown, that it was a pity the government had not got an industrial school, unless the government did something in the way of getting such a school, he would not send children like that to gaol. It was no use taking them there unless he could do something other than send to gaol; it was not a proper place to which to send children of that age.

**Six Months Hard Labor.**  
J. A. Cassels, aged 24 years, who described himself as a brackensman, acknowledged to Judge Newlands yesterday, that he had twice obtained money by false pretences. The Judge sent him to gaol for three months hard labor in each case—six months in all.

**C.P.R. Crossing Case.**  
On the 19th day of February, 1906, Mrs. Georgiana Bird, with her son Albert Edward was crossing the C.P.R. at McLean on a crossing which the company had made over the crossing of the wagon box turning upside down, with Mrs. Bird beneath. She sustained certain injury, and entered action against the C.P.R. claiming \$5,000 damages. This crossing was not a public highway. The crossing was made by the company in August, 1905, but it has never been recognized by the municipality of South Qu'Appelle, within which it is situated, as a public highway, the municipality always insisting that a crossing should be made on the public road further east. That act of the company, which the C.P.R. has its yard tracks, and at the present time have an application before the Board of Railway Commissioners to compel the company to use and on which the accident occurred, has not been sanctioned by the Railway Commissioners.

The matter was brought before Mr. Justice Newlands a few days ago. The negligence on the part of the company then alleged by Mrs. Bird was non-compliance with certain provisions of the Railway Act. That act requires, amongst other things, that any structure by which any highway is carried over or under any railway shall be so constructed and at all times be so maintained as to afford safe and adequate facilities for all traffic passing over, under or through such structure and a good and sufficient fence at least four feet six inches in height from the surface of the approach or structure shall be made on each side of such approach and of the structure connected with it. The crossing in question was not

fenced and Mrs. Bird claimed that it was too narrow to be safe.

Dealing with this point, his lordship, in giving judgment, pointed out that these provisions of the act apply only to a highway crossing the railway track. This was not a highway; it was not there previous to the building of the road; it was not the continuation of any street or public road but was made by the company in August, 1906, instead of grading the public road which crosses their tracks at the station yard. Further, it was held by the Chief Commissioner of the Board of Railway Commissioners that there was no court or authority other than that board which can make it lawful for either the railway company or any other body to construct highways across the line of railway. Bearing this in mind Judge Newlands could not consider the crossing where the accident happened as a public highway.

Mrs. Bird had contended that the crossing was not properly constructed and was not wide enough. In his lordship's opinion it was wide enough and under ordinary circumstances could be used with perfect safety. The approach took the previously been used safely by Mrs. Bird's son and others, and the accident could not have happened when it did if the horses had not become frightened and shied, thus throwing the wagon over the side of the approach to the ground below.

Mrs. Bird therefore could not recover damages. As to the question of costs, his lordship thought he should deprive the company of them. The company had no right to build the crossing where they did without the permission of the Railway Commissioners, and if that permission had been obtained they would have had to build the crossing with the Railway Act and fence it, and as they had not therefore performed their duty to the public without costs.

## TEACHERS HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

WILL RE-ORGANIZE ON BROAD-  
ER LINES—IMPORTANT RESO-  
LUTIONS PASSED

From Saturday Morning's Leader.  
Last evening the annual meeting of the Provincial Teachers' Association of Saskatchewan, at Victoria School, decided to consider the reorganization of their body on broader lines and passed a series of resolutions of no little importance. The association, presided, and teachers from all parts of the province were present.

The association decided to support for the coming year, the Territorial Teachers' Association Bureau, operated by J. P. Middlemarch, of Wolsley. Resolutions bearing on the preparation of examination papers and of offering certain criticisms, especially with reference to the mathematical papers, also urging the necessity for examiners to meet the sub-examiners and teachers, give his reasons for putting the matter forward, and present model answer papers, were discussed, adopted and ordered to be sent to the Department of Education.

**200 Day School Year Wanted.**  
Mr. Smith inquired whether any change had followed the Association's resolution that grants for the school year should be made on the basis of 200 days.

Mr. McCall, Deputy Commissioner of Education, explained that the commission decided, after mature consideration, that for the present, at least, the basis must be 210 days. Therefore Mr. Smith proposed, Mr. McLeod seconded, and it was carried: "In the opinion of the association it is wisest to make 200 days the year basis for the town and village public schools."

**Improving Examination Conditions.**  
It was decided on the proposition of Mr. Sifton, seconded by Mr. Collins, "That the chairman of each section from time to time compare the markings of the candidates, and that he has supervision over and endeavor to secure uniformity."

Mr. Brown proposed, Mr. Rymal seconded, and the motion was carried: "That the marks allowed to each question be printed on the examination paper for the guidance of candidates." In a further resolution the meeting requested the Department of Education to provide each candidate with a time table, and suggest that the hour of examinations should be changed so as to allow an interval of at least 1 1/2 hours about noon.

**New Officers.**  
Officers were elected as follows:—Hon. President, the Commissioner of Education; president, J. E. Dickinson; first vice-president, R. J. Dickinson; second vice-president, H. H. Hudson; third vice-president, J. K. McLeod; secretary and treasurer, Mr. C. W. Hutchinson, and J. Duff.

**Reorganization.**  
A proposition that the Association should include all the teachers in the province, and not only those called to examine papers at the annual meeting, being empowered to consider the matter and approach the Government as to the holding of a convention next year.

## C.N.R. PRESIDENT VISITS THE CITY

WILLIAM MACKENZIE AND C.N.R.  
OFFICIALS ON TOUR OF  
INSPECTION

From Friday Morning's Leader.  
In the course of a tour of inspection, William Mackenzie, president of the Canadian Northern railway company visited Regina yesterday and spent a few hours in the city before proceeding to Winnipeg. He was accompanied by D. B. Hanna, third vice president; M. H. McLeod, chief engineer and Geo. H. Shaw, train manager and travelled by train from Saskatoon, Edmonton and stations on the Regina and Prince Albert branch. Speaking to a press representative, Mr. Mackenzie stated that the inspecting officials were satisfied that the line was in good condition. He pressed to say whether they believed the transport facilities would be adequate for the carriage of grain this harvest, he declined to express a definite opinion, but hoped so. He denied that the visit had anything to do with the establishment of a C.N.R. station and goods yard at Regina. "The officers of the company," he asserted, "had not had time to consider the question, and he did not know whether an announcement as to the site could be made public."

In the absence of Mr. Cooper, Mr. A. E. Whitmore conveyed the friendly greetings of the Board of Trade to the visitors, who regretted that owing to the state of the weather they were unable to look about the city as they would otherwise have done. Retention was preserved as to the projected station and yard, and it does not appear that any other question of public importance was mooted.

The president of the company conversed for some time with the Premier, but no information as to the subject of the interview is available. Mr. Scott having explained in response to an inquiry that he felt unable to make a statement regarding the matter.

## ENTOMOLOGISTS VISIT REGINA

FORMATION OF NATURAL HISTO-  
RY FOR TOWN SUGGESTED  
—LECTURE ON INSECTS

From Friday Morning's Leader.  
A meeting extremely interesting to all lovers of natural objects was held the other evening in the museum room of the Government buildings, in which the different activities of the entomologists, Philadelphia, both well-known entomologists.

Mr. Fletcher gave a brief but interesting account of the naturalists' club of Ottawa, which boasts between 300 and 400 members. The speaker described the duties of the club, and the lecture programmes which it was customary to arrange for the winter. He appealed for a deeper interest in the study of natural history and for a greater exercise of our powers of observation with regard to the common objects of nature to be found in the West. Regina, he thought, was well suited for the formation of a natural history society. A large number of specimens were laid out on the table in the museum and with the aid of these and the speaker's description, the audience was enabled to see by such a society in this district.

Dr. Skinner gave an instructive address on insect pests showing how these injurious creatures carry on their destructive work. Andrew Hall, of Ottawa, also addressed the meeting and spoke on the fishes of the West. Mr. Hallett is out here in Saskatchewan yearly on a half yearly agreement.
