Unusual preparations have been made for holiday buyers, and every store seems full to repletion with Christmas goods. Those who do their buying now will avoid the rush and crush that is sure to characterize the last few days preceding Christmas.

The excellent sleighing that prevailed for two or three days last week caused a brisk revival among the children of the practice of "jumping" or "hanging on" sleighs and cutters. This is a matter that chiefly concerns the children, their parents, and the man that owns the rig, and we refer to it simply for the purpose of pointing out that the man who allows children to jump on his sleigh is responsible for their safety. This reminder is prompted by noting the indifference displayed by some men as to the safety of the little ones that he permits to ride on his sleigh.

On Monday evening a meeting of citizens interested in the construction of a tank on Mill street was held at the home of Mr. M. H. Eyre. The project in all its bearings was thoroughly discussed, and finally Mr. Eyre was appointed treasurer of the tank fund and given a subscription list for circulation among freeholders having property within the radius that could be served with 500 feet of hose. It was thought that contributions might be reasonably expected from about twenty-five owners. It is proposed to put down a tank 12x18 feet, and 12 feet deep (if the rock permit). Figures have been obtained for the excavating, and making reasonable allowance for all other charges, it is thought the cost will be about \$60, of which sum the village council will give \$15. The work will not be commenced until a sum sufficient to guarantee the cost has been subscribed. As soon as the list is completed a meeting of all subscribers will be held to discuss and arrange details.
