

PUBLIC HOUSE TRUSTS

The debate in the senate on public house trusts, and Earl Grey's public and private utterances, are doing just what our English friends feared, viz.—bringing this scheme for the control of the drink traffic before the Canadian people. We think the following presentation of the case ought to put a quietus upon any attempt to establish, on Canadian soil, such form of license.

Just about the time Earl Grey landed in Canada, "The British National Temperance Federation" published a manifesto addressed to "The Temperance Organizations of Canada." The Federation embraces thirty three temperance societies in England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales, and includes the large bulk of the working forces of this great reform. Let the manifesto speak for itself:—

"Dear Friends,—We hear with deep regret of a disposition on the part of some in Ontario to favor the creation of a Public Liquor Monopoly, whereby philanthropic, religious people may be induced to join in the setting up of a so called "Reformed Public-house Trust System"; or, in the creation of a State, or Municipal or other Public Monopoly in or for the sale of intoxicating drinks—whereby the entire community become implicated in the Liquor Traffic under the idea of improving its conditions and perhaps of applying part of its profits to counter-acting agencies.

"In the interests of the sacred cause of Temperance, and of the good name of your country and its influence upon the Motherland and other countries, we, on behalf of the enormous hosts of Temperance, entreat you to give no encouragement to any such idea, but to protest against and oppose it; no matter from what quarter such evil counsels may come. We have had a similar agitation to face for a series of years, and the intensity of our opposition grows with our increased knowledge of its evil tendencies. We trust that every branch of each Temperance organization will adopt and publish an expression of its unalterable opposition to this system."
