THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

The County Council has come and gone and the affairs of this banner agricultural district will now continue to go on pretty much the same as they did before the session was opened. As will be gathered from the full and accurate reports of the proceedings which have appeared in this journal, nothing of very great national importance was brought before the attention of the commissioners and they were not called upon to transact very much business of a revolutionary or radical character. They have, however, succeeded in putting in a fairly busy week of routine business and committee work—considering the advisability of making a few grants, etc.

During their spare moments they found time to complain that the cushions which heretofore have graced the chairs in the Council Chambers were not found in their usual places. This matter will be attended to in future. They also deemed it expedient to offer a little friendly advice to the Ontario Government and a resolution was passed petitioning the Legislature to reduce the number of M.P.P.'s one-half, in order to save some of the expense now incurred by the holding of Government sessions. Other matters of similar importance were brought up and disposed of.

The local press came in for its share of attention and the accusation was made that biased reports were published in connection with the dispute between the C. C. I. Board and the Council re the amount of the cost of maintenance of county pupils, which should be borne by the county.

the part of the Government the people of Kent may look with pride to their energetic young member in the House. Mr. Clements went to Ottawa pledged to act in the interests of the Canadian farmer and it is refreshing to note that he is living up to his promises and never fails to advance the farmers' interests when opportunity presents itself. It is very interesting to note the silence of the Government members when this matter was brought up the other day.

Friday was an uninteresting day at Ottawa. The House got almost immediately into Committee of Supply, the motion to go in being preceded by a brief and languid tariff discussion, in which not a single Minister thought it necessary to join.

The debate was commenced by Mr. H. S. Clements, of Kent. His point was the heavy difference between the imports of agricultural products from the United States and the exports of Canadian products to that country. The remedy for this he found in equality of tariffs. He would put the Canadian duties on agricultural products on a par with the American duties.

From the general he passed to the particular, which in this case was the tobacco industry, in which his riding is interested. He urged higher protection for Canadian tobacco and had a vision of its more extended use.

It is hoped that the Government may see its way clear to at least give some consideration to this question before the present session closes.

While Premier Laurier and his colleagues have been striving in vain attempts to patch up the misdeeds of their agents and servants the people have been looking in vain for the fulfilment of their pre-election pledges. One of these, a most important one, is the revision of the tariff. So far nothing has been heard from either the Premier or any of his ministers on this matter in which they were so willing to promise wonders.

LADIES' TUCKED SKIRT.

The combination of tucks, shirings and insertion results in a charming skirt to wear with odd waists or to complete a costume. The skirt is cut in three sections, each section having a straight lower edge. The girdele is used as the foundation for the shirings for the princess girdele, or if preferred the skirt may be fashioned in regular skirt effect, dispensing with the girdele.

The quantity of material required for the medium size is 7 1/2 yards of 26 inch goods, 1-2 yard of lining for girdele, and if flouncing is used 10 yards of 25 inch width will be required, or 5 1/2 yards of insertion to trim. LIGHTNING DEALS DEATH.

Alleghany Valley, Pennsylvania, Badly Struck by Electric Storm. Pittsburg, Pa., June 11.—From many points in Western Pennsylvania tonight some reports of death and damage by the severe thunder and electric storms. In half an hour several thousands of dollars' worth of damage was done.

At Kittanning, James Mitchell and his 15-year-old son, who were sitting on a porch, were struck and killed by lightning, and the house was set on fire. The rest of the family were stunned.

Death was also dealt by the storm at Foxonsawney where Clyde Bloese, aged 13, and Bert Weiss, aged 20, were struck and killed by lightning while standing in the doorway of a barn.

Stuebenville, O., June 11.—In consequence of the heavy rain Saturday, Rushrun, Deeprun, Saltrun and Shan-noun overflowed over four miles of the country near the Ohio River. Much property was damaged, many farm buildings were swept away and some live stock was drowned. Many persons had narrow escapes from drowning.
