SALE OF YOUNG GIRLS.

Mrs. Chisholm's Statements Contradict ed-Galicians In West Indignant.

ed—Galicians In West Indignant.

The remarks of Mrs. Chisholm of Wianipeg, at the W. C. T. U. convention in Hamilton recently, have created quite a sensation in Manitoba's capital. Mrs. Chisholm is reported to have asserted that young Galician and other slave girls are frequently sold for \$25 or \$50 to husbands they do not know. Philip Harvey, interpreter of the immigration office at Winnipeg. know. Philip Harvey, interpreter of the immigration office at Winnipeg, probably knows more about these people and their customs than any other Canadian in the west. Concerning Mrs. Chisholm's statement Mr. Harvey says: "I think that anyone making such a statement ought to be ashamed of it. How would English people like to have the same said of English girls? It is just as true of the English as it is of the Poles, I know every foreign settlement in the west, and I never heard the suggestion of such a thing."

Father Kulawy, Polish priest, is greatly incensed. He declares it is a crime to give utterance to such statements regarding the Galician people. "It is absolutely untrue; it is a pure invention. The Galician people are known as a most docile race; they are sincerely and deeply attached to their children. During my residence among them I saw daily proof of the devotion of the people to their children, and I never on any occasion heard of anything of this character. I think it necessary that the most positive and direct denial should be made to this statement. It is the invention of someone desiring to create a sensation."

Salaried Daughters. When there is need of her work in the home, and often help has to be hired to take her place, the daughter should be given a regular salery, approximately the equivalent of what she could earn outside after making allowance for head, room rent and the num-

preximately the equivalent of what she could earn outside after making allowance for board, room rent and the numberless privileges a girl has in her father's house. The salary should be at least equal to what would have to be paid for the same work if a stranger were called in to do it, and the duties should be as distinctly defined and as promptly and efficiently performed. This is a very different thing from an allowance without definite duties.

I know of several families where this plan has worked successfully, says a correspondent. In one instance the daughter, while unmarried, became a capable housekeeper and manager, buying all supplies and relieving both parents of care and annoyance, for which she received a housekeeper's wages at the end of every month. Another, whose mother is an invalid, gets a weekly envelope containing the same amount that would have been paid a nurse. Both these salaried daughters were happy, contented and efficient, and each had a feeling of independence and self-reliance never to be attamed under the "allowance" system or the usual haphazard appeal to father for money to gratify needs or whims.

Dr. George W. Spencer, writing in the American Physician on the care of the hair and scalp, says:
"Boys and men think they have to

have their scalps and hair scrubbed with soap and water and then dried by violently rubbing with a rough towel or submitted to a most wonderfully beneficial preparation, called a shampoo, which leaves the scalp in a tender and congested condition favorable for the color and sensitive atmospheric infection and sensitive atmospheric changes.

"The cleaning of the scalp should be very carefully and tenderly performed, using warm water with a mild soap, rubbing in gently and with the ends of the fingers, then rinsing with tepid wa-ter and drying by gently pressing the hair and scalp with a very dry towel, continuing until thoroughly dry, or, bet-ter still, dry it by fanning. If any application is necessary to bring hair thus dried into shape, dampen with a bichloride of mercury solution of one two-thousandths.
"Ordinarily this thorough cleaning

need not be done oftener than once a week, and in the interim the hair needs only to be brushed with a soft brush without allowing the brush to scratch

the scalp.
"The stiff brush, and especially that most injurious of all brushes, the mili-tary brush, which is frequently used for months several times daily until it becomes filled with dirt, can only be of great injury to the scalp because the vigorous scratching as well as breaking the hair."
