STEAMER GOES ASHORE IN STRAITS

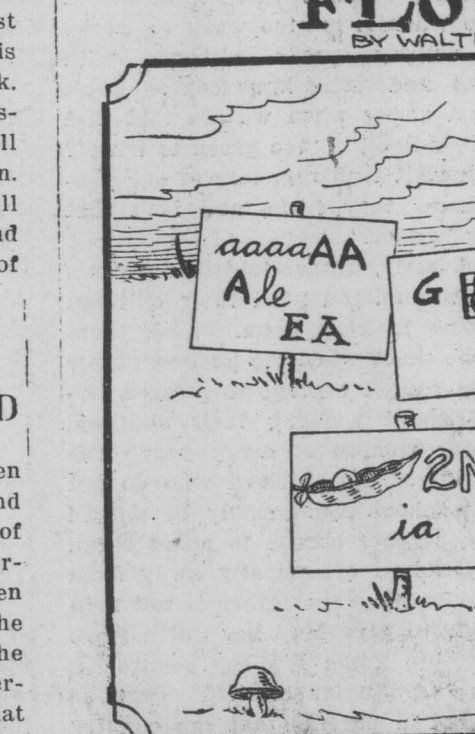
The steamer Koren Joegnaes, 2,331 tons, bound outward from Montreal, went ashore at 6 o'clock Saturday evening at Old Fort in the Straits of Belle Isle, according to messages received in the city Saturday night and yesterday.

The captain of the Glencoe, which ship arrived at Humbermouth from the Straits yesterday, wired the Reid Nfld. Co. as follows:

"Sighted steamer ashore at Old Fort, no account of crew as yet. Her boats gone, supposed they must land somewhere further to westward while they got stuff out of captain's room and chart room yesterday. Ship very much down, deck under water and on even keel. Think must have struck further to westward, where crew left her, as she did not strike where she is now—she is lying on level bottom."

Other messages said that the Donaldson line steamer Orithia had gone to the assistance of the stranded ship and in all probability the crew were taken off by her.

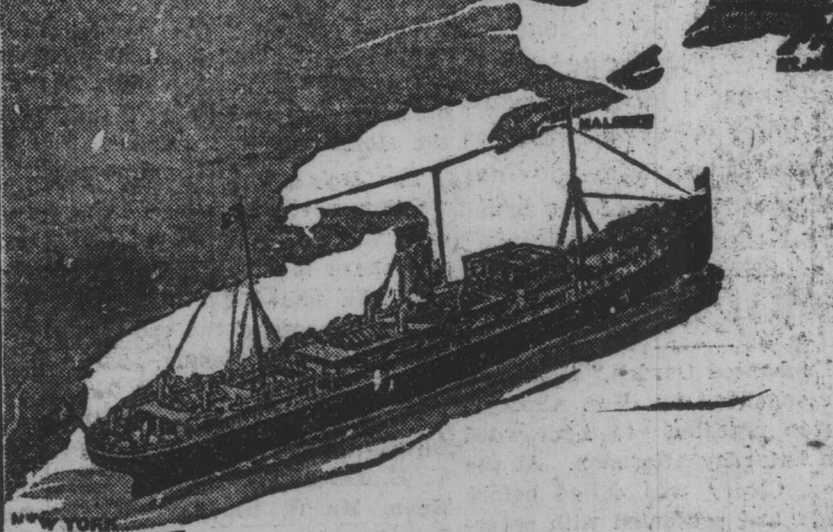
