

Boat Clubs Will Hold Up Regatta Committee Throws up the Sponge Indignation Strong Thruout City Public Protest Against Clubs Action

The Annual Regatta may not be held because the C. C. C. and C. L. B. Boat Clubs are not satisfied to put their boats on the pond unless all sweepstakes organized on the Regatta results, by any societies, clubs or charitable organizations other than the C.C.C. and C.L.B. boat clubs, are immediately withdrawn.

The Regatta Committee have not the power, even if they had the inclination, to make any such clubs, societies or organizations withdraw their sweepstakes. Even the Court has not the power to give authority to one club to promote a sweepstake while withholding that authority from another club of the same kind and having the same aims and objects.

The Regatta Committee and the boat clubs failed to come to an understanding at last night's meeting, and the Committee adjourned without naming a day to meet again. Orders for medals placed with the manufacturers have been cancelled.

The Regatta Committee were called together last evening to consider the following resolutions passed jointly by the C.L.B. and C.C.C. Boat Clubs: T. A. Armonry, St. John's, Nfld., June 28th, 1922.

At a joint meeting of the C.L.B. O.C. Boat Club and the C.C.C. Boat Club held this date the following resolutions were passed: RESOLVED—That in the opinion of the C.L.B. O.C. and C.C.C. Boat Clubs that in view of a society sweepstake now selling in the city and other clubs and societies contemplating sweepstakes on the Regatta that we cannot see our way clear to compete against these clubs and societies.

FURTHER RESOLVED—That in view of this fact we, the C.L.B. O.C. and C.C.C. Boat Clubs, jointly decide to take no part in the 1922 Regatta unless these clubs and societies withdraw their sweepstakes.

MR. HIGGINS'S ATTITUDE. Vice-President W. J. Higgins, in reviewing the resolutions said the position now was that the two Boat Clubs had decided that they were not going to row their boats, and as they were in charge of their property nothing could be done and there was nothing left but for the Committee to adjourn.

After the regular meeting the Medal Committee held a short meeting when it was decided to immediately cancel the order for medals and with this in view a wire was sent to the manufacturers cancelling the order.

The only other boats available are owned by the Rold N.B. Co. and are the Nellie R., Togo and Red Lion.

There is great indignation thruout the city over the holding up of the Regatta and it is hoped that some satisfactory solution of the difficulty will be found.
