

AT THE CITY HALL

COMMITTEE OF UNEMPLOYED ATTEND MEETING.

The City Council held its regular meeting yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presiding and Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden being present.

After the Minutes of previous meetings were read and confirmed, a deputation from the Unemployed, consisting of Messrs. Bennett, Vincent and Lunnaford, were admitted to the Council Chamber. During the week they requested an interview with the Council, to place before them certain matters in connection with the present labour depression.

Mr. Bennett, on behalf of the Deputation, in a lengthy address referred to the hardships to which many skilled and unskilled labourers and mechanics were subjected owing to lack of employment, and asked if the Council had in anticipation the opening up of works whereby ready employment could be obtained. He said he had been informed the Government advanced the Council, by way of guarantee loan, the sum of \$25,000 for purpose of relaying water pipe line and to relieve the situation.

The Mayor replied that the Council had asked the Government for this amount and the request had been acceded to, but he impressed upon the deputation the fact that this loan was obtained for a most urgent and specific purpose, that of protecting the city water supply by relaying the old water main, which was corroded for a distance of some 1000 feet that it would be mainly used in the purchase of heavy pipes and materials and that the work itself had been placed to contract, and at best would give employment to only thirty men for about three or four weeks.

Following this, Mr. Bennett again referred to a loan of \$150,000.00 which he stated the Government was prepared to give the Council to relieve the depression, and in reply was informed that the Council had not as yet been approached on this matter, and furthermore would not be in a position to take any loans other than those for works which are absolutely necessary; also that the Government had been asked for certain moneys for the erection of new sanitary stations, repairs to the dam at Gull Pond, Windsor Lake, and payment for lands taken during the relief works, 1921 (for which demands are being made by the owners); that all such loans would be a liability on the city and interest of 6 and 6½ per cent. had to be paid out of the current Revenue, and as the present interest on City Debt was somewhat in the vicinity of \$100,000.00 per annum, the Council could not, in justice to the taxpayers, further increase the taxes to pay interest on loans other than already provided for.

The Deputation thanked the Council for the hearing given them, and retired.

The following matters were then taken up:—

Communication from Chairman Johnson of the Dickinson Memorial Committee, with regard to the lights recently imported for the monument. The Engineer will supply the necessary information as to location.

M. C. Lynch asked reasons why services had been dispensed with in connection with the pump, Battery Road. The Council recently placed a new, up to date pump there for the benefit of the residents, and the same attention is not needed as in the past.

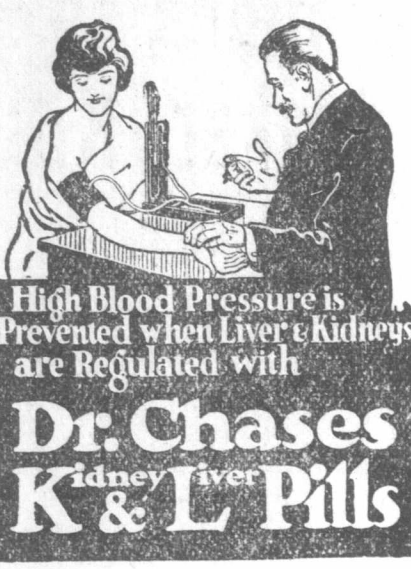
Applications were read from the Handmasters of the C.L.B., C.C.C. and Mount Cashel Bands, asking permission to hold concerts in Bannerman and Victoria Parks during the coming season. In this connection there has been some dissatisfaction amongst citizens owing to the Parks being used every night for the concerts, and it was thought that if two concerts weekly in each park could be arranged, the applications might be granted. The matter was therefore referred to the Bannerman and Victoria Committees for their consideration.

Mr. F. B. Williams, drew attention to the fact that motorists were in the habit of using that very congested thoroughfare, Casey Street in order to reach the Higher Levels, and he considered this was most dangerous, owing to the many children playing in the street daily, and should not be permitted, as serious accidents were likely to occur. A copy of his communication will be forwarded the Inspector General, for an opinion as to the advisability of closing this street to motorists.

Mr. E. S. Baggis, Allandale Road, asked why the Sanitary Department did not call in this, as in other sections of the city for collection of garbage. This was referred to the Sanitary Supervisor.

TROTSKY ATTACKS BRITISH POLICY

SOVIET WAR CHIEF WOULD ANSWER ULTIMATUMS WITH AIRPLANES.

MOSCOW, June 29.—(Associated Press)—An attack on Great Britain, hints of a Russo-French rapprochement and a plea for "more mental in our national character," marked an address by Leon Trotsky, Soviet War Minister yesterday, before the All-Russian Congress of Metal Workers.

"If an ultimatum is presented to us," he exclaimed, referring to the recent British notes, "let us create a detachment of airplanes. If a coup d'état occurs in Bulgaria, let us build another detachment of airplanes, and if there is a coup d'état in Persia, build more planes."

"The iron in our will must be transferred to the iron wings of airplanes, then we can say, looking high above at our squadrons, this is the coup d'état in Persia—and so on. If we transform the criminalities of the bourgeoisie into airplanes, then perhaps we shall be able some time to bring an end to their criminalities."

Trotsky said Great Britain and Italy, had, according to information at hand, assisted in the coup d'état in Bulgaria, and the British had aided in the nationalist overthrow in Persia. Declaring that Russia's losses in the world war were overwhelmingly greater than Britain's, Trotsky added:

"It was for this purpose, perhaps, that Lord Curzon felt strong enough to deliver his ten-day ultimatum; it was necessary that the blood of the Russian workers and peasants be shed. This account some day we shall present to the English bourgeoisie."

OLD POLICY

"England remains true to her traditional policy. In the international policy, her role was also dictated by her international policy. In reality there was a provocative role. When the English proletariat opens the safe of English diplomacy, the records will, if they are not already destroyed, show the real role of England in the world war."

"It is the same in regard to the Ruhr—if England had not wished France to do so there would have been no Ruhr occupation. To bring two peoples into struggle while they rest aside themselves, in order to appropriate the results, is the traditional policy of the English bourgeoisie."

Russia by violating saved herself from falling into Lord Curzon's trap, Trotsky said, finally giving the idea into the souls of the British bourgeoisie that Russia wanted peace.

"We have seen the English souls," he said, "they are good thick, heavy leather souls. From such leathery are built the skulls of the English Philistines, which one has to beat with a hammer for a long time."

Russia, he asserted, had again entered an alarming period in which threatened many complications similar to the British ultimatum and perhaps more serious.

FRENCH ADMIRATION.

In regard to a rapprochement with France the War Minister said some of the members of the French left and the petit bourgeoisie had told him they admired the Red army and thought that, if France were threatened with danger, it would be good to have such an army at the side of the French forces.

Trotsky declared that the Soviet diplomacy had torn to pieces the whole fabric of the bourgeois plans and that Russia had again gained a certain respite for a short period at least. No full guarantee of peace was yet in sight, however. There still remained the possibility of a gigantic revolutionary upheaval in the East and it was this that agitated England.

The British were greatly worried he declared, over the Soviet's new plan of giving further autonomy to the Russian dependencies in the East where, for example, Bokhara and Turkestan would soon have their own national armies.

"By this," he added, "we guarantee the inner strength of the republic, and the fighting ability of the Red army, and at the same time, without any intervention, we will be able to inflict a deadly blow at English Imperialism in the colonial countries."

Soviet Russia would gradually change to the militia system, the War Minister said, retaining one-fifth of the permanent army as a skeleton organization, while the remainder would be made up of workmen and peasants, who would be in training only part of the time.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Robert Lansing, former Secretary of State, has been seriously afflicted with diabetes, but is said by his physicians to have shown great improvement under the administration of insulin, the new remedy recently discovered and developed by Dr. F. G. Banting of Toronto.

ONCE THE RED MAN ROVED THE WILDS

But Now He Must Be In The Wigwag By Nine O'Clock.

The curfew is ringing in Caughnawaga and the tribes of the plain must obey its toll.

The free plains of the reservation are no longer free according to the tribal chiefs with the vermillion faces whose race from sire to son has been fed on raw beef who roamed the wilds and tracked the woods and were as free and fearless at night as in day.

But times have changed and the race must be protected according to the solicitude of an anxious Government. The spectral light of their Caughnawaga thoroughfare and the luminous rays of the moon are not good for them. But the tomahawk chieftain and his bronzed acorns are not without battle. The Indian in them is quite red and red it will be, they maintain, despite laws.

According to the new regulation it is illegal for members of the reservation under sixteen years to be on the street after nine o'clock.

A meeting of the tribes was held under the chairmanship of Big Chief Dominique Two Axe and a feeling of horror and indignation expressed. The chiefs feel like wielding the tomahawk and are determined to have the ruling set aside. It is another injustice to the Indians, they claim. Has not papoose Ra-wi-ti-ka, fifteen summers past, already shown himself a worthy member of any tribe by his conquest of the Lachine fly-weight wrestling champion?

Cannot Taro-Wira, although thirteen, hold his own with any little tough in the great city across the river, when it comes to fistfights? Have not these papooses, and many others of the village backyard bandits been girded with the Wampum belt and allowed to dance in the circle of the tribe, thus becoming full-fledged members of the band?

Who then will deign to tell these doughty warriors that they must not be on the streets after 9 o'clock. The chiefs, at Caughnawaga have notified the Department of Indian Affairs of their decision to ignore the new ruling.
