Ottawa, June 29 .- In committee the House to-day excellent progress was made with the western land bill, and the civil service bill. Discussion on both theasures was generally friend ly and calm in tone, and they were ward third reading.

Hon. Air. Oliver contended that the provision already in the bill under which the Governor-General cound appropriate lands for any purpose would in the meantime meet the point. At present he did not think a bin already important enough as it stood should be encumbered by additional clauses of the mature proposed.

That the matter should be dealt with as a separate question and as a matter of policy, was presented to and decided upon by Parliament after consultation with the Provinces interested. Messrs. Herron, Foster and Lake supported Mr. Meintyre.

Hon. Mr. Oliver again urged that the amendment be not pressed. Any arrangement made on this point would have to be made with the Provinces affected, a 1d it would be better to leave it, subject to the clause now in the bill, and which he had mentioned. The amendment was declared lost. Messrs. Jackson (Selkirk) and Burrows gave notice of amendments, which would add to the land for pre-emption a number of townships in parts of Mantoba. All the clauses were passed ave three, which stand over for further consideration, and progress was reported.

It would be impossible to bring these men under the cut-and-dried rules of the civil service, owing to the exceptional nature of their duties. He moved a resolution to the effect that appointments to and control of the Hansard Staff should be left to the Debates Committee of the House.

Colonel Same Hughes thought the House would be taking one way of maintaining dignity by keeping control of the Hansard staff. They should get a salary of \$6,000 a year. Mr. Borden thought officials of the House, exclusive of Hansard, should not be withdrawn from the control of the House, except by resolution of the House.

Hon. Sydney Fisher said there had been a feeding, in which he shared, that officers of the House might fairly be subject to the same restrictions as to qualifications and classification as other parts of the civil service in Ottawa. That was for the House to decide.

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY EVEN-NUMBERED SECTION OF Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Sasisat-chewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, nor reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acree, more or less. Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situate. Entry by press may, however, be made to father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

DITTIS—1) At least six months' resi-

son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

DUTIES—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in
each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires,
perform the required residence duties by
living on farming land owned solely by him
not less than eight (6)
in the sole of the sole of the sole of the sole

(3) A homesteader intending to perform
his residence duties in accordance with the
above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the
