The quantity of wheat and flour in transit on the 20th inst. was equal to 1,975,000 quarters, against 1,921,000 on the 6th inst. and 2,258,000 last year. Continental advices, state that French markets during the first week of March showed little activity in foreign wheat. At Marseilles prices had varied but little; the supplies of wheat were small, and the stock in the docks further reduced. At Bordeaux prices were well maintained for red writer on the spot and March-April delivery. Nantes was very quiet, but at Havre there was more activity at a further slight decline. Country markets continued to be scantily supplied with wheat, but the demand remained quiet, and prices varied but little for any article, although the tendency was firm. Of 92 reports received for the week 42 have quoted no change for wheat, 27 a rise, 20 firmness, and 3 a decline. Summing up the Angio-French situation, Mr. Rugel, a considerable French authority, says that England and France have, during the first haif the present season, imported 2,000,000 qrs. less between them than last year. Farmers in both countries have proportionately sold largely, as is seen by the early falling off in the offers of home-grown wheat in France and by the diminution in both countries. According to a Melbourne telegram of March 4, the shipments of wheat for Great Britain from Melbourne, Adelaide, Sydney, and Queensland during February were 184,000 qrs. making a total of 187,000 qrs. for the two months of January and February, against 34,000 qrs. in the corresponding period last year. During the present month comparatively large shipments were expected to be made, judging from the number of vessels chartered. The February shipments, which were much larger than those of January, were due to reach England about June. From India the shipmentsshowed no sign of immediate increase, and, so far, the amount of forward business in the new crop was very small. The total quantity of Indian wheat on passage for the United Kingdom and Continent was 0,400 qrs., against 138,000 qrs. last year.
