

Religious News.

The pews in St. Patrick's New Cathedral New York, have been already partitioned. The 257 matted out with pews on a diagram represent a rent-roll of \$32,000. Ninety eight pews are unpriced. Some pews were auctioned. Of these Mrs. Navarro secured first choice for \$2,100 per annum, second choice, Mr. Eugene Kelly \$750; third choice, Judge Donohue \$500, etc.

The following Resolutions have been passed by the Newfoundland Methodist Conference, now sitting at St. John's:

Resolved.—That Brother Geo. H. Bryant be allowed to become a Supernumerary, that a letter of sympathy be sent to him in his affliction.

Resolved.—On motion, that our Missionary Committee consist of twelve, viz six Ministers and six Laymen.

Resolved.—That the aims of the Educational Society be urged upon all our Congregations during the coming year.

Resolved.—That each Minister bring the matter before the Congregation under his charge, calling on them for increased liability in support of these necessary funds.

Resolved.—That a General Conference Collection be made annually on all our Circuits.

At the biennial session of the Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland, held at St. John's, the following were elected as Executive Committee for the ensuing year:—The Lord Bishop of Newfoundland and the Ven. Rural Dean of Ava on the Rev. T. M. Wood being members ex officio:—

By the Clergy—Revs. J. F. Phelps, F. R. Murray, E. Botwood, W. Pilot, and A. C. F. Wood.

By the Laity—R. J. Piment, Esq., Q. C., Hon. A. W. Harvey, G. T. Rendell, Esq., Dr. Crowdy, Hon. J. S. Winter, and E. Dunder, Esq.

Among recent deaths are chronicled Bishop Hilariu Sillani Vicar Apostolic of the Southern Vicariate of Ceylon, India (March 27); Rev. Cannon A. Lut of Lucerne, Switzerland (April 9); Rev. D. H. Haigh of St. Mary's College, Ocot: England, May 10, and the Rev. John Bertazzi, eminent for his volunteer devotion to the yellow fever sufferers at Chatanooga, Tenn. Father Bertazzi died at Jacksonville, Fla., where he had repaired through ill health.

During the last three years the Catholics of the United States have added 35 colleges and 313 parish schools to their institutions, so that now they have 98 of the former and 1,958 of the latter, besides 557 academies and select schools and 23 theological seminaries—in all 3,636 educational institutions. The seminaries contains 1,155 students.

The annual convention of the Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey met in New Brunswick, May 27th. Bishop Scarborough began his charge with an account of his recent trip in England and then spoke in favor of established parochial schools. In conclusion he expressed his disapproval of the public schools where reading the Bible did not form part of the exercise.

While these are left, you are, in point of fact, unharmed.

A Noble Son.—There is a story in ancient history of a famous judge who was a great favorite with the Roman Emperor. Among some prisoners brought before him, who had been fighting against the Romans, was an old man with long hair and unshaven beard, and garments torn and stained; but in spite of all disguise, the judge instantly recognized his own father. He had taken up arms against his Emperor, and he was to be tried for his life before his own son. It was a terrible moment for both. Some sons would have pretended not to know

the prisoner; some would have forgotten the precepts held sacred, even by the heathen left the judgement seat, and approaching the Emperor, said: "I ask but one favor, I am the friend of the Emperor, my father was his enemy; either forgive my father for my sake or take my life with his."

He saved his father's life, for the Emperor immediately pardoned the prisoner, and by this noble act gained himself another friend, for he who had been a rebel henceforth was a loyal servant of the State.

Scientific.

A Scottish physician has tested the tincture of chirehona as a remedy for drunkenness. He does not think it can effect a permanent cure, but finds it valuable in the treatment of delirium tremens, as it immediately checks the craving for strong drink. On recovery however, the appetite for liquor seems in no wise diminished.

An interesting discovery has just taken place in connection with the ancient Castle of St. Andrews, so closely associated with early Scottish history, and famous as the scene of the murder of Cardinal Beaton. Recently workmen having been engaged excavating the foundation of a house, to be erected at the foot of Castle Street, just opposite the Castle and finding a difficulty in procuring firm foundation, they had to dig down and when 16 or 18 feet from the surface they came upon an excavation in the solid rock, which, on being cleared of the earth, was found to be the entrance to a subterranean passage. On being explored, the passage ran a considerable distance and ultimately, with the assistance of those on the surface an exit was made on the green sward immediately under the south-east side of the Castle gable. The passage is four feet deep and proceeds in a winding direction under the castle moat, and then appears to be diverging passages but they have not yet been explored. According to tradition there was a subterranean passage from the castle to the cathedral on the residence of Queen Mary of Scots, situated at the east end of South Street, and it will be very curious if this turns out correct. The discovery has naturally caused much speculation.

Agricultural.

If refuse fish can be procured cheaply feed it to your poultry they are exceedingly fond of fish, and a little given to them at this season of the year is very beneficial.

A Colorado farmer counsels the agriculturists of his State to stick to their farms, and not be induced to leave their comfortable homes for the mining regions where so much discontent and uncertainty are in store for them.

The most effectual method of preventing cows from kicking is to have a strap buckled tight around the body just forward on the hip bones and close to the forward teats. They may dance a little in first trial, but they soon give it up and remain quiet. After using it for a time it can be dispensed with, as they will stand quiet without it.

Young fowls are the best for laying eggs, it is not good to keep hens beyond the second year. Good authority on such matters says:—Feeding will do a great deal—a surprising work indeed—in the production of eggs, but not when old hens are concerned, they may put on fat, but they cannot put down eggs. Their taste is told, their work is over.

A teamster in Maine says he can start the worst balky horse by taking him out of the shafts and making him go round in a circle till he is giddy. If the first dance of this sort doesn't cure him, the second will. To cure a balky horse, simply place your hand over the horse's nose and shut off his wind till he wants to go, and then let him go.
