

to whom the building of the wing was let some three years ago was again reviewed, and the Opposition strongly condemned the Government for their attitude towards Mr. Lowe. They also pointed out that the Government had previously issued debentures for the asylum annex. But the money had not been used for this purpose, and there was no guarantee that the money it was now proposed to raise would not be used for ordinary revenue. The bill was read clause by clause and adopted on a party vote, after the following amendment, introduced by Mr. M. McKinnon and seconded by Mr. Shaw, had been ruled out of order.

Whereas, for several years past the insufficiency of the accommodation afforded to patients in the Hospital for the Insane has been prominently brought before the House; and Whereas, a sum sufficient to provide the necessary accommodation has been borrowed by the Government; and Whereas, the failure of the contract with Mr. Walter Lowe has retarded the construction of that necessary work; Therefore Resolved, That in the opinion of this House the difficulties with the contractor should be adjusted, and all the damaged material on the ground should be disposed of in order that the Government may be enabled to proceed with the work. During the evening session the committee stage of the bill was completed. The hour for closing saloons on market days was fixed at 7 o'clock, and the penalty for treating was fixed at from \$2 to \$5. It was also provided that a medical man who gives a certificate for liquor other than for medicinal purposes shall be liable to a fine of \$100. After the clauses relating to bar meals, clubs, and some others were struck out, the bill was reported. The House then adjourned.

During Thursday, the appropriation bill, a bill relating to the reclamation of marsh land, road scales and other matters of this nature were attended to. During the evening session, Hon. Mr. Farquharson moved the third reading of the bill regarding the taxing of certain incorporated companies and associations. The House divided on the motion as follows: Ayes—Farquharson, McDonald, McLean, McMillan, Richards, McNutt, Rogers, Frowse, Forbes, Reid—11. Nays—Gordon, Shaw, A. J. McDonald, J. A. McDonald, Arsenault, M. McKinnon, DesRoches, Campbell, Birch, Kichham—10. The motion was declared carried and the bill passed.

Hon. H. C. Macdonald moved that the bill taxing certain classes of traders do not pass. The motion was attended to the following division: Ayes—Farquharson, McDonald, McLean, McMillan, Richards, McNutt, Rogers, Frowse, Forbes, Peters, Reid—11. Nays—Gordon, Shaw, A. J. McDonald, J. A. McDonald, Arsenault, M. McKinnon, DesRoches, Campbell, Birch, Kichham—10. Further consideration, in committee, of the Fisheries and fishing rights, to the clause relating to the granting of leases of beds of rivers, lakes, etc., or for fishing licenses, &c., at Mr. DesRoches who, with other members of the Opposition made a vigorous fight against the bill, moved the following amendment, which was seconded by Mr. Arsenault: Provided always that only existing oyster beds or grounds on which no oysters are to be found, shall be granted or leased for the cultivation of oysters, excepting in cases where the oyster licenses were already issued.

The House divided on the amendment as follows: Ayes—Gordon, Shaw, A. J. McDonald, J. A. McDonald, Arsenault, McKinnon, DesRoches, Campbell, Birch, Kichham—10. Nays—Farquharson, H. C. McDonald, McLean, McMillan, Richards, McNutt, Rogers, Frowse, Forbes, Peters, Reid—13. The amendment being lost, the Speaker took the chair and the chairman reported the bill agreed to. In amendment to the motion that the report of the committee be adopted Mr. DesRoches moved that the bill be re-committed for the insertion of the amendment he had previously moved. The House divided on the motion, which was declared lost on the same division as before. The third reading of the bill was set down for next day.

The Premier then submitted the following resolution: Resolved, That an humble address be presented to Her Majesty the Queen, setting forth both the provisions of the British North American Act of 1867, respecting the legislative functions of the Senate of Canada, are unsatisfactory and should be so amended as to bring that body more into harmony with the principles of representative government and praying that Her Majesty may be pleased to recommend to the Imperial Parliament such an amendment to the said Act as will provide that if the House of Commons passes any Bill and the Senate rejects such Bill or fails to pass it, or passes it with any amendments to which the House of Commons will not agree, and to which amendments the Senate adheres, the Governor General may by message upon the advice of his council convene a joint sitting of the two Houses, which sitting shall decide by a joint vote without debate the question in controversy between the two Houses. Mr. Campbell rose to a point of order claiming that the resolution was not properly before the House as the resolution regarding the formal tabling of resolutions should be adjusted, and the same complied with. Hon. Mr. Farquharson said he had copies of the resolution struck off and they had been on the desks of hon. members for about ten days. Mr. Campbell said this was not the point in dispute. He moved an amendment to the resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Shaw. The amendment was that the resolution should be amended so that the House should be empowered to refer the resolution to a committee of the House to report thereon. Mr. Shaw pointed out that a resolution regarding an address to the Lieutenant Governor asking him to have certain papers and documents brought upon the state of the province brought down had been ruled out by the Speaker who claimed that the address of the House had to be directed to the tabling of the resolution. The present resolution was moved by Mr. Campbell who coached him as to the subsequent tabling of the resolution. Hon. Mr. Farquharson said he did not remember the circumstances, but accepted the hon. member's word. He had no objection to the amendment. He moved before the point had been discussed at some length the Speaker raised the objection raised by Mr. Campbell and declared the resolution out of order.

The House adjourned. In consequence of the sharp turn affairs had taken on Thursday night the Senate resolution, the Government were a little taken aback, and were afraid to promise prorogation on Friday without permission of the Opposition. The Opposition, however, was not desirous of using their advantage to prolong the session. It was agreed to meet at 9 o'clock on Friday morning. The House accordingly met shortly after nine and after routine, the Senate resolution was moved by Premier Farquharson. He said this was an important resolution, but as the time was short he would reserve his remarks until he had brought a resolution up in this House. The resolution was then read and the hon. member who moved it said that the Senate had become a political machine. We picked men out for the House of Commons who are second to none in America, still old men were appointed to the Senate to defeat and block their legislation. The majority in the lower house must prevail, and they should be helped by the Senate. Last year the Senate on the Tullin Railway acted seriously. Two or three hundred loads of men awaited the building of that railway, and were ruined for life by the defeat of that bill. That would be virtually the same for nothing. The Senate thinks it is going to continue ruling the country. He thought, however, that the people shall rule. The resolution was seconded by Hon. J. B. McLean. Hon. Mr. Gordon looked back to the state of the provinces at the time when they were almost in anarchy. They had been in Canada, put their heads together and said that if the provinces were not united these British possessions would become a thing of the past. They copied part of the constitution of other countries and founded the best constitution the world has ever known. The Senate is the keystone of that constitution, and he was glad to find the Leader of the Government had taken the people into his confidence and raised their voices to save their liberties. When the Senate stopped the Tullin Railway they saved the country 3,750,000 acres of land. When the Senate defeated the Drummond Railway they saved the people \$1,000,000, and he hoped that now the people would save the Senate and thus save their own liberty. He moved an amendment to the resolution as follows: Whereas, after the most mature deliberation by the absent members of the Senate, it was resolved that party issues and political partisanship should be buried in view of this great and momentous question of the confederation of the British Provinces in North America; and Whereas, the Senate is the keystone of the North American Confederation, and the Senate and House are constituted as clearly defined and distinct bodies, and the Senate is appointed to the Maritime Provinces; it is evident that the interests of these Provinces have been most amply cared for; and whereas, after 32 years of confederation the public utility administered as to the admission of the Mother Land and the respect and attention all the Maritime Provinces have shown to the Mother Land; and whereas an effort is now being made to interfere with the constitution of the Senate and to remove its keystone; and whereas the Senate and the people and thus subvert the very foundation of Confederation; Therefore Resolved, That the carrying into effect of the proposed change in the constitution would act injuriously to the best interests of the people, and should not be entertained by the House inasmuch as it would destroy that great principle of representation, that of consulting electors on questions of the most vital importance to the Dominion of Canada. In seconding the amendment Mr. Shaw said this was a very important resolution, and he was glad to see that the resolution did not originate with the gentleman opposite; we know that they are only obeying their masters. In 1867 there was a movement for the confederation of the British Provinces. The people in some of the provinces were divided on political and religious matters. So even were parties balanced that three governments were defeated in one year. A series of meetings were held in Charlottetown, Halifax and St. John's. One reason for the failure was that there was a great and well organized south while we were divided and would ultimately be absorbed by that nation. The greatest mind in Canada saw the necessity of confederation. If there was one thing more than another laid down by the lower provinces it was that the Senate would not be abolished. They were prepared to be represented in the Lower House according to population, but confederation would never have existed if it had not been that they got the same representation in the Senate as the people of Ontario. The Hon. Leader said the Senate resolution was the object sought for by the fathers of confederation. This constitution was framed when party feelings were at their height, and the greatest statesmen were engaged for the benefit of the people. The Leader of the Opposition said we should do away with this, and the people should rule. How would they rule with a joint house. If the Legislature thought that the Senate was important the Government would have agreed to the people and then the Senate would not have to object to the contract if it was backed by the people. The object is to give the people a better bargain for \$1,000,000. The Senate and the House are not to be divided. The Senate is to be a charter to build a railway to the Klondyke without a subsidy, and an order-in-council was issued valuing the land at \$10 per acre, which the Government proposed to give. In view of the great saving to the country we are not justified in voting for the Government resolution. Mr. Campbell said that we all have a sacred duty to perform. We should not be found hectoring up the cause of any party or becoming a mere echo for any party and wiping away the greatest name of the country. He had there been nothing done for the people of P. E. Island by the Senate but what was done last year when they amended the Franchise Act so as to make it workable in this Province would not be found interfering with it. The Leader comes here and at the back of Sir Wilfrid tries to interfere with our rights. We have seen how they have done it. If this is an important measure it should have been brought up long ago. The Leader said it was ruled out of order. It is only by the courtesy of the Opposition that it is brought up now. This resolution will have an injurious effect and it should never have been brought up in this House. The House then divided on the amendment as follows: Ayes—Gordon, Shaw, A. J. McDonald, J. A. Hon. Mr. Farquharson, then submitted the draft of an address to the Queen along with the resolution. It was decided that it be presented to the Governor General by the members of the House who are members of the Executive. Some further business of a routine character completed the work of the session, and at 7 o'clock, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor Howland prorogued the Legislature with the usual formalities. An Act to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Mutual Fire Insurance Company. An Act to incorporate the Mount Stewart Forester Hall Company. An Act to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Dairying Company. An Act to incorporate the Grand District and School District of the Independent Order of Good Templars of Prince Edward Island. An Act in amendment of the Charlottetown Liquor Regulation Act. An Act to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act. An Act to authorize the Board of Education District No. 141, to borrow money for an extended term of years. The Ontario Government has passed an order in-council authorizing an expenditure of \$800 in the purchase of seed grain to be used for the relief of certain settlers at Kennebec, in the northern end of the country of Frontenac. The families for whom the relief is intended number about eighty, and they are in a deplorable state of destitution owing to the destruction of the crops by the ravages of the locusts of infectious diseases having appeared among them. The American line steamer Paris, Captain Watkins, from Southampton, Eng., and Cherbourg for New York, struck on the Mingling Island on the night of Sunday morning at a point half a mile from where the wrecked Mohagan lies. Seen at the time of the collision was the high tide, and in a dense fog she ran ashore. From the first there was no danger. The lifeboats and life jackets were literally surrounding the vessel to render assistance. The majority of the passengers, who numbered 586, were brought to Falmouth, where they obtained lodging for the night. Capt. Watkins reported that his ship was lying comfortably in smooth water and that there was no occasion for any alarming reports.
