The examinations for this Inspectorate were held at Goderich, Exeter and Dungannon on Dec. 19th, 20th and 21st, 1888. The papers set for this examination were very fair. The maximum number of marks was 735, number necessary to pass 367.

The examiners hope that in future the teachers will give special attention to these important things—writing, spelling and neatness. We have no true education when these are wanting.
