## U.S. Census of Fisheries

Census Director Durand of the United States Census Bureau, co-operating with the Bureau of Fisheries is issuing a special report on the Census of Fisheries of the United States.

In 1908 some 143,881 persons handled \$9,000,000 worth of nets, seines and lines and caught some \$54,000,000 worth of fish.

There were fewer fishermen employed in 1908 than in the period 1904-8. The number of vessels for 1889 exceeds that for either of the subsequent canvasses; and the tonnage of vessels shows a decrease each succeeding period. In valuation the oyster fishery leads, salmon comes next, and cod third, the value of the latter being almost \$3,000,000.

Massachusetts is the leading fishing State with a \$7,000,000 catch to its credit; Virginia is credited with \$4,700,000 worth of fish; New York with \$4,549,000; Washington with \$3,513,000; Florida with \$3,389,000; Maryland with \$3,306,000; and Maine with \$3,257,000.

With the total American catch of \$54,000,000 worth, some \$6,000,000 worth was exported. Against this the imports amounted to over \$13,000,000. The imports were mainly herring, canned sardines, mackerel and lobsters. The exports consisted chiefly of salmon and oysters. Fresh fish formed only a small part of their exports or imports.

## News From Channel.

### GULF SEALFISHING REPORT.

Special Evening Telegram.

CHANNEL, To-Day.

The Southern Cross arrived from the Gulf at 8 p.m. yesterday and hails for 13,000 prime young harps. She reports the Viking with 17,000, the Labrador with 9,000, and the Kite with 2,000 on March 26th. The Cross struck the main patch on 18th March, 25 miles N. W. of Bryon Island, and had 8,000 killed and on board when the vessel was caught between two sheets of ice which broke eight bend timbers on the port side. The balance of the seals were taken between the 18th and 25th. On Sunday, the 26th, the ship bore up for Port aux Basques. There are no reports of the schooners or of the Harlow. The Prospero arrived on coastal service yesterday forenoon, remaining but two hours, but terminal port mail should be six hours more, especially now that the Cabot Strait route is closed. This, however, is only another instance of what we have to expect under Morris. Private reports state that the Premier's recent meeting at Grand Bank was a frost. The Southern Cross is still in port. Wind S.E., heavy breeze, sleet and snow. Harbor filling with drift ice.

## Beresford for Peace Compact.

Put Declares "You are Never Going to do Away With War."

London, March 21.—Admiral Lord Charles Beresford warmly endorsed the Universal Peace Movement in the House of Commons last evening.

He said:—"If we can get the nations which make up the Empire and the United States to come together and throw in their power to try to influence all other powers on the side of peace much will be done to delay war. It might not stop war, but it would give us time to pause, and if we should get time we should often have no war."

"You are never going to do away with war," he added, "unless you are so well armed that an enemy cannot attack you."
