Cable News. Labrador Report

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 3. The Constantinople correspondent of the Chronicle sends the following despatch: "The Sultan passes many hours praying at various shrines. He grants frequent audiences to the German ambassador. I am assured that at last the Ambassador has proposed, on the Emperor's advice, that Turkey should cede Tripoli to Italy, the Emperor undertaking that Turkey will receive adequate compensation. Russia gives repeated assurance that she will not allow complications to arise in the Balkans. A special commission has been formed to recruit volunteers for the country's defence. From all parts of Serbia and Montenegro great military activity is reported. Turkish reinforcements have been sent to Janina. Turkey sent a final note to the Powers last night appealing for friendly intervention. If the response is unfavorable, orders will be given to begin military operations."

SFAX, Tunisia, Oct. 3. The Arabs here are quiet, but anti-foreign outbreaks are feared. The Greek steamer Alkistis has arrived here with three hundred refugees. The steamer left Tripoli on Saturday afternoon and reports the Arabs entrenched in the hinterland. The Italian squadron is stopping all steamers and sent several away from Tripoli. One which was ordered off carried a number of correspondents.

MALTA, Oct. 3. Seven refugees aboard the Castle Garth went insane from their sufferings. Most of the fugitives are penniless. Several Americans aboard the steamer report that the Arabs and Turks in Tripoli are on bad terms. The Arabs are suspicious of the Turks, fearing the country is about to be sold. The British fleet is still here.

MALTA, Oct. 3. The Italian flag flies over Tripoli. The British cruiser Aboukir has arrived here, bringing word that the Italian revolutionary force has landed and taken possession of the city.

LONDON, Oct. 3. A despatch to Lloyds from Corfu says that the Italian flotilla sank two Turkish torpedo destroyers and captured a third in the engagement off Gomentiza, Albania.

BELGRADE, Oct. 3. Serbia has commenced to prepare for warfare in the Balkans. King Peter has convoked the Cabinet, and the mobilization of the army is ordered.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 3. The Italian fleet has bombarded and destroyed the port at Prevesa, and the city is occupied by the Italian troops.

Fire Fighters Crushed to Death.

Louisville, Ky., Sept. 23.—An avalanche of bricks from the upper walls of a burning six-storey building in the wholesale district occupied by David Baird and Son, crashed through three floors of an adjoining building to-night, killing three firemen and injuring several other men.

The injured are Jacob Steelnet and Arthur Mantanus, employees of the Kentucky Wall Paper Company. The two clerks were dug out immediately, but it was more than an hour before the rescuers got to the bodies of the firemen. The Baird loss is \$300,000.

S. S. SOLWAY BACK FROM NAIN.

The S. S. Solway, Capt. Parsons, returned from Labrador at 11.15 last night having been down to Nain where she reached on the 24th September; fine weather prevailed the whole trip with N. and N. W. winds. The Stella Maris, Capt. Barbour, was waiting at Nain when the Solway arrived there. Capt. Barbour reported that all the floaters that had been fishing on the Northern part of the Coast had gone south; many of them had good trips of fish. The passengers who were brought up from Baffin Land by the Stella Maris were transferred to the S. S. Solway, viz., Rev. Mr. Peck, Mr. Belby and Mr. Fleming, all of them Anglican Missioners. The Solway left Nain on the 25th and had fine weather till Saturday night when a S. E. gale set in with a high sea and heavy rain. The ship had terrific weather crossing the Straits and coming up the French Shore. Twillingate was reached at 1 o'clock Sunday morning. After leaving there the wind veered round to the N. W. with a cross sea. Sunday night the weather got very rough and the ship lay too till daylight when Capt. Parsons ran for Catalina, omitting to call at Wesleyville by necessity. The Solway brought a half cargo of freight and 70 passengers, most of whom were landed at Conception Bay.

Up to the time the Solway left the coast two steamers and thirty large schooners had sailed from the Coast to market with cargoes, and there are still eight schooners there now making up cargoes. Capt. Parsons believes that the total catch on Labrador will be 160,000 qtls. The following is Capt. Parsons' statement of the shipments made when he left the Coast:—

There are eight schooners still on the Coast loading and they will, it is estimated, take about 25,000 qtls. The amount that the floaters bring home for shipment added to the above will bring the Labrador voyage up to 160,000 qtls.
