More Delay Probable.

According to the Evening Chronicle of yesterday, letters have been received from the Prime Minister, Sir Edward Morris, conveying the intelligence that he intends to leave for Newfoundland by the S. S. Pomeranian, which should sail from Liverpool, according to schedule, on Saturday next, but the sailing of which may be delayed a day or two. She is not likely to reach this port before the 25th or 26th of the month. According to the Daily News of this morning the sailing of the cruiser Plana with His Excellency the Governor and suite is set down for the 20th inst. According to these statements, the Governor will leave the city some days before the Prime Minister arrives in the city. It follows, therefore, that His Excellency will not have an opportunity of future personal discussion with the Premier on the Morison Memorials, on the invitation of his Prime Minister to outside investor to seek information as to the opportunities of investments directly from the Ministerial heads of Government departments in St. John's, on the direct conflict between the statement made by the Premier that he never had an interest in timber wealth with the record filed in the Registry of Companies, and the hearing of these matters on one another, for some considerable time. If, as is said His Excellency will be away from the city for some six weeks, such an opportunity as we have mentioned, may not occur until the beginning of August. It would appear, therefore, that there is a probability that the decision of His Excellency in regard to the Memorials may not be available for publication until some time in August. If our surmise is right, the time which will have elapsed between the publication of the decision and the presentation of the Memorial will be remarkable for duration, which will be in marked contrast to the promptness with which the Morine decision was given.

Almost Drowned

Last evening the 4 year old son of Mr. Geo. Whitten of the South Side, came within an ace of being drowned. Unknown to anyone and unobserved, the boy wandered down on his father's wharf and in some manner got overboard. He made no outcry for a long while but feebly moaned, when he became so exhausted that he could hardly struggle any longer. Fortunately Mrs. Garrett was then passing near the wharf, heard the cry, and rushing out to the head of the pier saw the little fellow on the surface. She bravely clambered down the wharf, reached for him and got him, and by superhuman efforts succeeded in getting the boy up on the wharf, where he lay in a state of collapse. The woman does not know how she performed the risky feat and she was overcome with fright when her brave act was accomplished. The boy was revived after some time. A few minutes more and he would have been drowned. Some few years ago another little boy of Mr. Whitten's was drowned over the same wharf.

Serious Charge Against a Constable.

ELI SHEPPARD ARRESTED AT BAY ROBERTS—RELEASED YESTERDAY, ON BAIL OF TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS.

From people who arrived by to-day's train we obtain information of charges of a most serious character against the policeman stationed at Bay Roberts. The purport of it is that a young man some time ago married the adopted daughter of Const. Eli Sheppard, of that place, and that as their home was not ready to occupy she continued to live at her adopted father's house. The woman is in a delicate state of health, her husband became suspicious that all was not right and interviewing his wife got from her a confession which badly compromised her former guardian. Certain details are of a character which cannot be published, but our informants say that since her marriage she received brutal treatment at the hands of the officer while in his home (alleging that she was handcuffed by him) and the matter was of such a nature that the husband laid the facts before Judge Oke who with Constable Grouchy came to Bay Roberts Monday, took the woman's deposition and brought the policeman back to Harbor Grace in custody. Yesterday he was released by Magistrate Oke on a bail of \$2,000, until the serious charges can be investigated by the authorities.
