The S. S. Fogota, Capt. B. Barbour, arrived here at 12.30 p.m. to-day from the Northward. She had a fine run down and at Musgrave Harbour met the heavy Arctic ice at noon on Saturday. The ocean was covered with hazy fog and the ship had to butt her way through to that port getting there at 10 o'clock on Saturday night.

She left again on Sunday morning at 4 and reached Seldom at 12 noon. She had slob ice all the way from Seldom to Wesleyville and made all parts of call except Change Islands, which she could not reach for ice. She brought a small freight and as passengers Dr. Smith, H. Davis, Mr. Murphy, S. Hodnett, Miss Peckford and 5 in steerage.

To-Day's News. Out on the War Path.

LONDON, To-day.

The Suffragettes held heated meetings last night. Mrs. Pankhurst and other leaders denounced both the enemies and supporters of suffragettes for their treachery. They declared an end of the truce which the women had observed, while waiting Parliament's action on the Bill. "Deeds not Words," was the motto displayed above the platform where Mrs. Pankhurst spoke. She asserted women would consider how to do as much damage to property as possible. Some of her lieutenants failed to agree with her policy. Miss Kenny, one of the most prominent of the militants, advocated smashing both property and heads. The executive council of the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies adopted a resolution, rejecting Asquith's offer of facilities for private members for a Bill next session. Several speakers said women had proposed a plan of action which for the present was secret, but which would surprise the world. Several women were arrested. Some declined to give their names. One is believed to be Miss Pankhurst, who was captured in St. Stephen's Hall, leading to the Commons, where she was making a determined attack on a large painting. The police dispersed the crowd in Trafalgar Square, where a man and a woman was trying to make speeches. The famous militant Mrs. Despard, was taken to the police station with six others. Practically the whole police force was on duty all night. Strong guards were stationed at all public buildings. A special watch was kept on the Post Office and letter boxes. Mrs. Pankhurst's denunciation of the Government was fiery and bitter. The force of the Reform Bill is played out. She said "either those who framed the Bill were ignorant of parliamentary procedure, they were unfit to occupy positions of responsibility or they were scoundrels of the worst kind. It has been a mock battle all arranged. Harcourt and Lloyd George were seen going arm and arm into a music hall on Saturday. Can you imagine them saying 'well, now that we have dished the women, let us forget about it, and go and see the cinematograph.'" In the Commons the Premier repudiated the suggestion that the Government had been guilty of sharp practice in regard to the question of Women Suffrage. He declared members of the cabinet thought the proposed amendment audacious, that they had honestly endeavored to carry out their pledges and challenge a decision from the House on Women Suffrage. The Government had now pledged itself to give to Women Suffrage a Bill introduced by a private member next session, the same facilities as it had given to controversial government measure, allowing members complete freedom to vote in accordance with individual predilections.

Where Is He?

HAN NOT SEEN FOR SIX WEEKS.

The friends of James McDonald, a man well known in the West End, has not been seen by his friends for over six weeks past and there is such conjecture as to where he can be. McDonald was a man who had a home of his own, but occasionally, carried with a resident of the Southside and often without any shelter. He was in the habit of going on board schooners after they entered port and getting his meals from the crews. The people he met nor the places he usually frequented in the West End, have not seen him for a long while, and to some it has occurred that he might be the man whose dead body was found about a month ago in the stoke hold of the Carthaginian, after she arrived in Glasgow from this port. We have been requested by persons interested in him to ask for information as regards the man and if he is in the city, no doubt it will be made known. McDonald was a man of about 60 years of age and was well known.

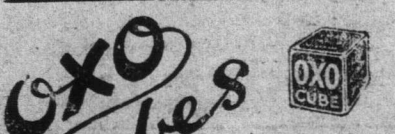
