LONDON, To-Day.
 The King and Queen gave a party
 last evening at St. James' Palace in
 honor of Prince Arthur of Connaught
 and the Duchess of Fife, who are
 shortly to be married. Eight hundred
 guests were in attendance. The wed-
 ding presents were displayed, most
 notable of which were a diamond tiara,
 the gift of the King and Queen; gold
 dessert service, the gift of the Prince
 and Princess Royal.

BERLIN, To-Day.
 The Foreign Office reached a con-
 clusion last evening on the existing
 situation in Mexico such as necessi-
 tates the presence of a German war-
 ship in Mexican waters. The cruiser
 Hertha, which is now being used as a
 training ship, will be selected as the
 most available warship for duty along
 the Eastern Coast of Mexico. She
 sailed from Halifax yesterday for New-
 port. A cruiser from Europe scarcely
 could be chosen for this work as the
 German squadrons have been depleted
 by the withdrawal of four cruisers for
 service in the Mediterranean owing to
 recent hostilities in the Balkans.

HAVRE, To-Day.
 A wireless despatch from the La
 Touraine, which is expected to reach
 here at 8 to-morrow morning, was re-
 ceived to-day saying: Ten children,
 several without parents, two women
 and three of a crew, are among the
 forty-two survivors of the Voltourne on
 board.

NEW YORK, To-Day.
 In an aeroplane race, over a course
 approximately sixty miles, yesterday,
 William S. Luckey, driving a 100 horse
 power biplane, won the first prize,
 \$1,000, offered by the New York Times,
 by completing the route in 55 mins.,
 54 seconds. Second prize, \$700, went
 to Charles F. Niles, in a similar bi-
 plane, who covered the course in 54
 mins., 55 secs.
