### Local Merchantman

Leaves Her Bones in the Waters of the Harbour.

The schooner Mary and Mildred, Capt. Williams, reached port at two o'clock this morning with a cargo of salt, after a lengthy passage from Cadiz. The vessel struck a pan of ice off Cape Spear last evening and punched a hole, about six inches long in the starboard bow. She began to leak, but the working of the pumps kept her free until she was safely docked. About 5 a.m., the pumps became choked with salt so that the inrush of water gained headway, flooding the vessel, which gradually began to settle down in the water and sink. At 8 o'clock she parted her moorings and went to bottom, after carrying away a considerable portion of Davey's wharf. The crew only saved their belongings, but the fittings of the vessel and the Captain's nautical instru-
