OTTAWA, To-Day. The resignation of Hon. LONDON, To-Day. A despatch from Christiania says that great demonstrations against the unsatisfactory food situation were held throughout Norway on Wednes-The Government, with a view to preventing rioting, prohibited the sale of alcoholic beverages for three days, and as a result of this order the restaurants were closed. OTTAWA, To-Day. Daylight saving in Canada will be given a trial. Notice of a Bill to provide for the introduction of this scheme has been given by Sir George Foster. It is entitled "An Act to provide for the time in Canada being in advance of mean solar time during the summer months."

BRITISH RECRUITING IN U. S. A

NEW YORK, To-Day. The British recruiting opened with a rush yesterday. More than 500 men applied and about 90 per cent, passed the physical test. Among them were several English actors now playing here, including George Hassell of the "Onboy" Company, Colin Campbell, Duncan McRae, Leonard Muir, Rol-and Bottomly, Malcolm Denn and Roland Young. Jack Binns, who as wireless operator was the hero of the steamship Republic disaster in 1909. aviation corps. BRITISH ATTACK IN BELGIUM.

LONDON, To-Day. The British have opened an attack on a nine mile front between Messines and Wytschaete and have taken all their first objectives. An official statement says that the British progress is being continued and that a number of prisoners have been taken The text of the official statement folows: We attacked at 3.10 a.m. this morning German positions on the Messines-Wytschaete Ridge, on a front of over nine miles. We have verywhere captured our first object tives, and further progress is reported to be satisfactory along the whole front of attack. Numbers of prisoners are reported already to be reaching the collecting stations.

LONDON ELATED. LONDON, To-day. The morning newspapers to-day the toll exacted from the German air raiders, which they regard was a terible price to pay for a raid which effected virtually nothing of military importance. It is generally assumed that the ten German machines were lost, which some of the commenta-tors express belief is almost enough to cause the Germans to cease repeti-tions of their airplane raids. The Camage inflicted on the reaiders, in connection with the reduction in the inking of vessels by submarines, and the naval and airplane attacks on the enemy bases in Belgium, has instilled a spirit of elation in the editorials and news columns generally.


