straight out manner but with sly dig-  
ging, innuendos, quotations of foolish  
things they had heard and say, etc.  
It seemed to me that as they talk-  
ed I could see a slight stiffness come  
into the expression of several of the  
other women especially of one who  
has always been on the fence. One  
would almost feel a sense of antagon-  
ism in the air. Now what good did  
these two women do the cause they  
believe in? None whatever. On the  
contrary they probably did it infinite  
harm.

Yet I know that they do love the  
cause and that one of them (the one  
who was the most tactless in her

## The Girls of Liege.

In the fine city of Liege, where the  
war began, there are wild doings. No  
city of Belgium has rejoiced more  
turbulently and extravagantly at the  
hour of deliverance. But in the  
midst of the rejoicings there have  
been walls of terror. The Germans  
have gone, but the people of Liege  
have been mobbing their own girls.  
Young girls and comedy girls they  
are; for they are the girls who could  
not resist the lure of the German  
uniforms and who, during the four  
awful years of German occupation,  
smiled on the Hun and accepted  
their attentions. Now these girls  
are being hunted down by men and  
women of Liege, and when they are  
found their hair is being sheared  
close to their heads. A bald pate  
is never a mark of feminine beauty.

In Liege it has become a mark of  
shame and obloquy. In a rougher  
sort these girls who showed favor to  
the despoilers of their country would  
have met a sterner punishment. The  
republicans of France sent to the  
guillotine young girls who presented  
nosegays to the Prussians and Aus-  
trians when they crossed the fron-  
tier, even though it was indicated  
that the girls had no motive other  
than to appease the enemy and to  
win leniency for the occupied lands.  
To-day girls who were far gentler are  
not short of their heads, but merely  
of their locks. For a time they will  
bear the scorn which they deserve.  
But locks will grow again, and wigs  
are available. Mob violence is never  
admirable, but it will be a stern  
critic who will condemn the men  
and women of Liege. One can im-  
agine the superior smirks of the hus-  
sies who basked in German favor,  
and the bitter resentment of the pa-  
triotic burghers. Four years was a  
long time to endure German tyr-  
anny. It may have been even harder  
to endure the "airs" of the flimsy-  
headed maidens who disgraced their  
Belgian name. On the whole, the  
Liege plan seems poetically appro-  
priate. The offenders would never  
have been guilty had it not been for  
their comeliness. The only weapons  
that can destroy feminine comeli-  
ness without inflicting harm are the  
shears of the barber. A Solomon  
could have devised no fitter punish-  
ment without straining the quality of  
mercy.

## Wild Tales From Paris.

(From the New York Commercial)

Anyone who gives a moment's  
thought to the wild tales of a quar-  
rel between Marshal Foch and Gen-  
eral Pershing will see that it cannot  
be true unless it is to be regarded  
as a charge against the American  
general on which he should be tried  
by court-martial. None can believe  
that he disobeyed the orders of Pres-  
ident Wilson as Commander-in-  
Chief of our forces, yet that is the  
alleged fact on which this piece of  
fiction is based. We have been led to  
believe that President Wilson was  
chiefly instrumental in having Mar-  
shal Foch appointed generalissimo of  
the Allied and American forces in  
Europe. General Pershing has con-  
sequently been acting under Foch's  
orders, just as have Haig, Petain and  
Diaz. General Pershing may have  
suggested the plan of campaign, or  
some part of which Foch accepted,  
but to say that he took matters into  
his own hands, consolidated the Am-  
erican forces and fought the heavy  
engagements in the Marne and Ver-  
dun sections in defiance of Foch's  
orders or wishes is false on its face.  
These stories of friction between  
Foch and Pershing charge Pershing  
with exposing American soldiers to  
risks and slaughter for his own per-  
sonal glory and advantage. In sub-  
stance they mean that Pershing ad-  
ded at least 120,000 to the American  
casualty lists, a sacrifice of 20,000  
dead, who would be alive to-day had  
Pershing followed the instructions of  
his military superior. The relatives  
of those who died would rise up and  
demand that General Pershing be  
court-martialed and shot, if the stor-  
ies were true. Why should anyone  
try to destroy General Pershing's  
reputation in the hour of triumph by  
charging him with sending American  
soldiers to their death for his per-  
sonal glory? Do the authors of these  
tales comprehend the meaning of  
their own words.
