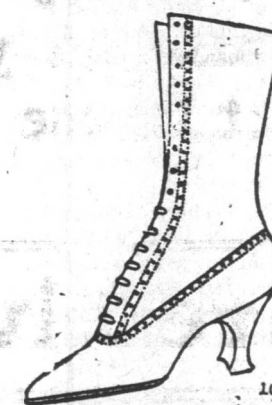

Break Record after Record—The Great Educational Campaign, directed in the interests of the Methodist Church of St. John's.

The second quota for St. John's of \$200,000 has been subscribed by more than \$11,000, and now the magnificent working organization is out to surpass all previous days' records, and bring in for Monday night's report an amount sufficient to bring the grand total up to a quarter of a million dollars. This means that approximately \$40,000 must be secured between the report meeting Friday evening, and the meeting Monday night, and with the enthusiasm which prevails, everything points to a successful completion of this magnificent sum.

REID NFLD. CO. BOOSTS.

Great impetus was given to the Campaign last evening, when that famous aggregation "Team 16" announced that a pledge of \$10,000 had been received from Mr. H. D. Reid, President of the Reid Newfoundland Company. This pledge was announced amid the greatest enthusiasm. The workers demonstrated their ap-

proval of this public spirited act by long applause. "Team 16," as all other teams, have made a splendid record in this Campaign, but the climax was reached last evening when Hon. R. A. Squires announced that his team had secured for the day \$14,095. This is the best record of any team in a single day.

When Mr. C. R. Duder announced the Reid Nfld. Co.'s subscription, Hon. R. A. Squires immediately moved that an acknowledgment be sent by wire to Mr. Reid in New York, expressing the high appreciation of the Campaign Organization for his splendid gift. The motion was seconded by Capt. A. Kean, and carried unanimously by a rising vote.

CHAIRMAN H. N. BURT WINS.

Division "D" carried off the honors Friday evening, with the splendid total of \$18,175.50.

A MEMORIAL SUBSCRIPTION.

Mr. Joseph Peters addressed the meeting, and after giving several personal experiences, suggested that a number of subscriptions had been given in memory of friends who had

made the Supreme Sacrifice during the war, stating that such contributions would be graciously received and that proper notations would be made either in the College Home or in the additional part to the College Building.

FRIENDS INCREASE SUBSCRIPTIONS.

Capt. J. W. W. McNelly stated that he had met some subscribers who informed him that if they had known of the magnitude of the project, they would have given a larger subscription. The meeting was of the opinion that there was yet time for them to reconsider their subscriptions and increase their amounts.

Mr. Hockenbury then gave some timely advice and suggestions, advising the teams that assignment cards were now abandoned, and that workers should again canvass those who were undecided or on "the fence." He promised that a large number of these would subscribe before Monday night. He expressed high appreciation for the work of the press, and the Banquet Committee, Mr. A. Soper and Mr. H. Blach. There will be no meeting to-night (Saturday). The final meeting will be held Monday night, a banquet to be served at 7 o'clock. Mr. Hockenbury stated that the final day was always the best, and as he had such a fine body of workers he believed that great things were in store.

After giving three hearty cheers for the General Chairman, the meeting closed with the National Anthem.

Pearlers' Profits.

"For a capital of £300, it is possible to find a fortune and in any case to make sufficient money in a few years to retire comfortably." This statement was made to the writer a few days ago by one of the largest precious stone merchants in London, when talking of the profits of pearl fishing.

"The demand for pearls is far greater than the supply," he continued, "and I have advised and assisted several men, including two Army officers, attracted by the adventure of the undertaking, to try pearl fishing in the South Seas. £100 for passage and expenses; £80 for a lugger, £80 for gear, crew and stores for six months, leaving £40 for emergencies, is the total outlay.

The first six months fishing should yield at least two tons of mother-of-pearl shell. This sells in a market which fluctuates between £100 and £200 a ton, and will cover all initial outlay. In addition, of course, there is always the possibility of finding good pearls, which may be worth anything from £50 to £1,000 each. Pearls are not only scarce, but the

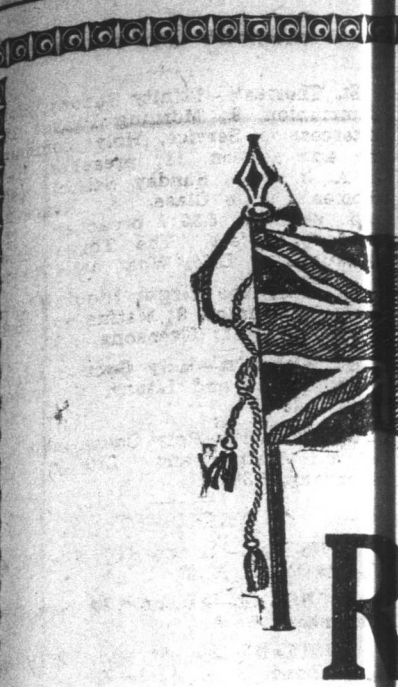
