## Methodist National Campaign.

The final meeting of the Campaign found the College Hall crowded by a happy and enthusiastic body of ladies and gentlemen. Almost 100 per cent. of the Team Workers responded to the call of the Organizer at 7 o'clock sharp. By the liberality of the ladies of the Methodist congregations, a bountiful supper was provided. The good cheer provoked a good fellowship that was contagious, and enthusiastic, and an evidence of the unity of spirit prevailing among the city congregations. Immediately following the reports of the results of the canvass for the day by each Team Captain, addresses were delivered by Revs. Armp and Bryce from Toronto, and the Rev. Dr. Bond, President of the Nfd. Conference. For the laymen, the Hon. R. K. Bishop was the speaker. The result of the final canvass showed a total of \$5,643.15, (details of which are appended), and for the week a grand total of \$19,488.70. To this amount other subscriptions are to be added from several well-known liberal givers, who are at present away from home. The objective of \$20,000 set by the Conference Executive to be raised by the city congregations, is certain of achievement. In several of the Outport Circuits the Campaign will not be completed for a few weeks. When the entire campaign is closed, the results will no doubt be creditable to the Methodism of Newfoundland, and in keeping with the well-known liberality of the congregations.
