What Atolls Are.

It has been shown by the investigation conducted by scientific expeditions to the Pacific Islands that there is a slow elevation going on there, that by lifting the reefs gradually above the waves, preserves them from erosion at the top and enables vegetation and certain animal forms of a terrestrial character to exist there. This is in opposition to the old idea that the atolls were formed by the gradual subsidence of small islands and that the coral insects build up encircling reefs as the islands sank. Recent reports show that the elevation of the islands is a general phenomenon, but variable in amount, some islands rising rapidly and others very slowly. Both the flora and the fauna of these islands are confined to a very few species, although, seen from a distance, some of them appear very rich in vegetation.—Washington Star.

What is Sleep?
Although it is more necessary to life than food, we must confess that up to the present the exact cause of sleep is not definitely known. Careful observation has made us familiar with the physical condition of the body during sleep, and from this it would appear that it is a condition of debility. Thus although no physical or mental function is absolutely absent all the normal activities of the organism are apparently lowered. The blood pressure is lowered, the heart beats more slowly, respiration is slower and less deep, and the amount of air inspired by a normal man during sleep is only one-seventh of that used during similar periods of quiet wakefulness. The chest and limbs usually increase in size during sleep owing to changes in the circulation which facilitate the passage of fatigue products into the blood streams. There is certainly an increased vasculature of the skin, which is often flushed, and the brain left with less blood is comparatively anemic. It is owing to this increased action of the skin that we are so easily chilled during sleep. It is when we come to consider the state of the cells in the brain during sleep that we are baffled and conjecture must take the place of certainty. The gray matter of the brain is composed of numerous cells which are connected and linked together by fine nerve pines. These cells receive sense-impressions from all over the body, and after interpreting them, send out controlling messages for the proper working of the various organs. When we try to realize that in a normal brain there are more than 9,000,000,000 of such cells, all linked up together, we gain some idea of the complexity of this wonderful nervous mechanism. Each of these cells is provided with fine branching fibres which on account of their tree-like appearance are called dendrites—from the Greek word "dendron," a tree. It is thought probable that they either retract, leaving a space which cuts off nerve currents or, conversely, that they become more intimately connected, causing a general diffusion of nerve energy. Either of these conditions would favor and induce sleep. It is, however, as well to remember that the real changes may, after all, be in the nerve cells themselves, for when a tree begins to wither the earliest apparent signs are noted in the smallest branches, although the seat of mischief is probably in the root.—A Physician in London Daily News.
