LEONARD OUTPOINTS TENDLER.

For Lightweight Championship.

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, July 23.—Benny Leonard, of New York, successfully defended his title of world's lightweight boxing champion against Lew Tandler, of Philadelphia, in a fifteen round bout at the Yankee Stadium to-night, before a crowd of at least 65,000 persons.

Leonard won easily. It was his second victory over the challenger. It was one of the champion's easiest victories. He was at his best and the challenger was in about the worst form he has displayed since he became a serious contender for the title.

Leonard was accurate and hit hard. Tandler was extremely inaccurate and left the champion unmarked.

Round 9.—They came together slowly, sparring. Tandler missed a right lead. They clinched tightly. Leonard landed a right to the jaw and took a left to the jaw. Tandler backed away from Leonard's lead and the crowd roared. Leonard backed slowly to the ropes, avoiding Tandler's rush. They clinched in a neutral corner, moved out into the centre and clinched again. Tandler sent his left to the champion's ribs but little damage. They exchanged body blows in a clinch. Tandler drove Leonard into his own corner with overhand lefts to the jaw and the crowd grew excited. Leonard landed two light jabs to the face, Tandler rushed in again. The champion clinched. They were squaring again when the bell rang. Both men took it easy.

Round Two.—Tandler continued to lead, lashing out a right to the jaw. The champion fell into a clinch. They had a light exchange and clinched again. Tandler rushed into Leonard's arm and took an overhand right to the jaw. Tandler drove the champion to the ropes, where they had a furious exchange, to the challenger's advantage. Leonard jabbed swiftly with his left and crossed two hard with his left to the jaw. Leonard resumed the

defensive, meeting Tandler's next rush with a right to the head. He then caught the challenger with left jabs and pounded him with his right. Tandler walked into a trap in a neutral corner, taking blows from both hands when Leonard lashed out. It was a fast round.

Round Three.—They sparred in the centre of the ring. Tandler again taking the lead at Leonard's pleasure. They had a furious exchange of body blows, moved to the centre of the ring and clinched. Tandler led again, catching Leonard with his deadly left, pounding him with his left which he moved in a horizontal cross-fire from belt to head and back again. In the next exchange the champion fared better, landing a short right uppercut. Leonard caught Tandler with a hard right to the jaw and sent him spinning to the ropes, but remained cautious. Tandler landed a light right and a hard left to the jaw and the champion sank a right into Tandler's midriff. They clinched. Leonard clinched on Tandler's next rush. Benny stepped back, landed two rights to the body and hooked two lefts to the head. That was how the round ended.

Round Four.—Tandler led with a right but was short. Leonard retaliated with his left, sending two long upper cuts to the jaw. They did a lot of dancing and Leonard jolted Tandler with a left hook to the jaw and repeated. Leonard landed twice heavily to the head in a clinch and then soaked Tandler in the left eye. Tandler landed two hard lefts to the head and then was caught with his back to the champion who reached round and curved his right into the challenger's body. Leonard sent two short rights to the body that hurt. They exchanged lightly to the body in a clinch. Tandler left hooked the champion's jaw then shot a right below the heart and was short with two rights. Leonard caught the challenger with two stiff rights to the jaw just before the bell, stopping the challenger's rush. Tandler's seconds showered him with water when he came to his corner.

Round Five.—Leonard met Tandler's rush and they exchanged evenly, moving to centre of the ring. Leonard was getting much of the clinches now, shooting both hands to the challenger's jaw and then crossing both hands to the challenger's jaw when they separated. They clinched tightly and then Leonard separated ineffectively with his left. Leonard sank a right to Tandler's jaw and then whipped two upper cuts to the jaw. Tandler landed a left to the mouth and then hooked his left to the breast. The champion jabbed expertly with his left which bothered Tandler, who missed and ran away. Tandler caught Leonard with a hard right to the jaw, then took a left to the head. They rushed into a stiff body exchange at the bell.

Round Six.—The majority of experts agreed that the champion was leading by a comfortable margin at this stage. They met in the centre and clinched. Tandler hooked a left to the jaw a moment later. They danced around. Tandler's right was short and Leonard slashed him with a left to the head as they clinched. Then the champion whipped his right to the body and bothered Tandler with a left jab. Leonard had much the better of a clinch, sending both hands to the jaw. Leonard backed to the ropes for a rest and stepped aside when Tandler moved up, allowing the latter to slip through the ropes. When the latter regained his equilibrium, they shook hands in the centre of the ring. Leonard sent solid rights to the jaw, the body, and to the jaw again and had no difficulty in avoiding the latter's left lead. The champion appeared the last worried as they backed away from a light exchange at the song.

Round Seven.—They sparred for a second after the bell and then both fell away. Leonard gave an opening and Tandler rushed in with light left to the body and bothered Tandler to the jaw. Tandler stopped for a moment and Leonard shot two rights to the jaw. Tandler turned away and Leonard whipped two rights to his exposed body. Leonard dug his right under Tandler's ribs. They exchanged lightly and when they came together, Leonard sank two more hard rights just above the belt line. Tandler again walked into the neutral corner trap where he was caught with a two-handed attack to the head. Tandler who was making a poor showing, fell back against the ropes and Leonard used both hands to the jaw. They sparred lightly and were boxing when the bell rang.

Round Eight.—Tandler's manager used force in his talk during the intermission for the champion had a wide margin by now. Evidently Tandler took the advice for he rushed twice into the lead but his accuracy was as poor as before and Leonard took a respite. The referee cautioned Tandler for using the rabbit punch. They danced around. Leonard caught Tandler with hard rights to the jaw and sent a few more when Tandler clinched. Tandler landed two short

uppercuts and then took two body blows. Tandler punched the champion's kidneys. Tandler sent a resounding right into the stomach that gave a terrific plump. Leonard caught Tandler with three right crosses in the champion's corner and the challenger appeared worried when the bell rang.

Round Nine.—Tandler's handlers knotted his muscles. Leonard landed lightly with his right. They sparred around the ring and then clinched. Leonard's left was bothersome and Tandler clinched. Tandler walked into a straight left and then was cautioned for hitting low with the same hand. The champion blocked him effectively in two clinches. Tandler walked into Leonard's stiff right jolts and the champion crossed and hooked. Tandler became more inaccurate and missed with his left again and fell nearly through the ropes. Leonard pounded Tandler's body with his right and then forced the challenger away by sending the same hand to the jaw. Leonard upped him sharply with his right and then lashed his right to the challenger's stomach. Leonard pounded some more at the body. They were separated at the bell.

Round Ten.—The champion revolved around the challenger who stood in the centre of the ring. Leonard backed into a neutral corner and landed swiftly two hard rights to the head. Leonard missed a short straight uppercut. They clinched. Leonard easily ducked Tandler's advance and stopped his next rally by holding out with his left hand. Tandler was again unsuccessful in trying to break through Leonard's defence, stopping more jabs and falling into a clinch. Leonard right-hooked and sent a right uppercut to the jaw in close quarters. They sparred. Leonard smashed Tandler on the jaw with a hard right and they were sparring at the end of the round.

Round Eleven.—They stood in the centre of the ring and again the champion danced around his opponent. Tandler fell into a clinch. Leonard upped him with his left and hooked with his right. Tandler caught the champion and hooked his left to the body. They clinched. They boxed and danced about. Then they sparred. Then Leonard laced out with his left and absorbed Tandler's advance with a clinch. They exchanged short body blows. They backed away and did it again. Another similar exchange was followed by light sparring. Leonard stopped Tandler's next advance by sticking his left hand under Tandler's armpit, pushing him partly to the floor. The crowd laughed and whistled at Tandler's inability to get beyond Leonard's left jab with which he protected his wise lead. Tandler walked disgustedly at the bell rang.

Round Twelve.—They sparred cleverly. They clinched. They locked their left arms and exchanged rights to the body. Tandler was short four times with an overhand right. Tandler landed a light left, two light rights and another light left. Tandler stopped short and punched his adversary on the head with his right and then allowed him to clinch. Leonard was having a lot of fun with his left jab which was serious enough Leonard speedily countered Tandler's advance with a right to the head, but was unable to land an uppercut in a clinch. Tandler's nose was trying to bleed. They clinched. They were sparring when the bell stopped them.

Round Thirteen.—Tandler's handlers were excited and doused newspapermen in their corner with water. The fighters walked into a clinch. Leonard hooked with his left and then hooked harder with his right to the jaw. He smashed Tandler's with a battering right. Leonard upped him with his right then pushed Tandler away. They clinched. Leonard whipped a right to the chest and they clinched. Tandler ducked two easy rights and then fell against the ropes for an opportunity to rub his nose. Leonard hooked two hard rights to the head. He then sent a hard right to the jaw and then a hard left. He smashed left to the body which sent Tandler to the floor. The champion sprang to this advantage like a cat but it was a question of whether Tandler slipped. When Tandler stood up he had time to rub off his gloves on his thighs. Leonard sprang at him punching to both body and jaw and Tandler fought back. One of his blows was low and Leonard objected to the referee. The bell rang then and Leonard's manager stepped into the ring protesting.

Round Fourteen.—They clinched.

Tandler appeared slightly groggy and the champion was anxious for a knockout. Tandler covered his face with his two fists, while Leonard failed him in a brief. Leonard sent a short right uppercut to the jaw and then went into speedy action. He whipped out his right like a piston grooved to its mark. He landed it three times.
