Dear Sir,—Will you kindly allow us space in your valuable paper to reply to a reporter's article in the Mail of last evening, dealing with the subject of a new Directory. "LIGHTS OF NEW YORK" TELLS A GRAPHIC STORY OF SUCCESS AND DISILLUSIONMENT.

Life in a metropolis, with its bright lights and sinister shadows, successes and reverses, heart aches and triumphs, are vividly portrayed in the Fox production, "Lights of New York," which comes to the Majestic Theatre Monday.

Notable in the cast is Marc McDermott, who enacts the rôle of a stock broker who becomes a derelict after his sweetheart marries a rival. The dramatic power that Mr. McDermott gives this part brings it to the highest level of screen acting. The toast that his friends drink to his faithless fiancée strikes the keynote of the story.
