

The Lieut-Governor at the Exhibition.

His Excellency arrived on the Exhibition Grounds by half-past eleven, and was driven to the Judges' Stand, in the horse ring. Having alighted, attended by the same retinue, Mr. Jas. Laidlaw read the following address:

To His Excellency the Honble William Pierce Howland, C.B., Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Ontario.

We, the President and Board of Directors of the Central Exhibition, Guelph, most cordially welcome your Excellency to this our second annual gathering.

Our county has for many years occupied a prominent position for the superior quality of its stock, and products, and with a desire to bring still more prominently before the Dominion our fine products and manufactures, and to stimulate a generous spirit of emulation among our agriculturists, mechanicians, and artists, we, with the liberal assistance of the County Council, and the Council of the Town of Guelph, have again held the Central Exhibition, which we hope successfully to continue yearly, and thus promote the prosperity of this portion of the Dominion.

Your Excellency has had many opportunities of visiting Exhibitions of a similar character, and we trust that in many branches of industry, and particularly in the live stock department, this one will compare favourably with any your Excellency has visited in the Province. Our county is well adapted for farming purposes, and our farmers have kept pace with the progress which is so marked in this and the surrounding counties.

This year (with the exception of a few localities) we have been blessed with a bountiful harvest, and the general prosperity which characterizes the whole Dominion at the present time is none the less visible in this section of the country. Your Excellency will find among the Exhibitors not those of this county alone, but many of the best farmers and mechanics from all parts of the Province. The Legislature of Ontario have made most liberal grants to the Agricultural Societies throughout the Province, and this liberality has done much to develop its resources.

Your Excellency will be pleased to see that the encouragement thus given has tended to the most satisfactory results.

Your presence and kind acceptance of our invitation to visit our Exhibition is esteemed a special favor; and we trust your Excellency may long be spared to visit us from year to year, as our Exhibition recurs, and thus encourage our efforts to promote the welfare of this portion of Her Majesty's Dominion.

His Excellency made the following REPLY.

Mr. President and Gentlemen: Having been prevented last year by illness from fulfilling my engagement to join you at your first Exhibition, it gave me especial pleasure to receive your invitation to be present here to-day.

The spirit of enterprise and improvement which has characterized the inhabitants of this county, has established for them a high reputation among agriculturists not only of the Dominion, but also of the United States, and I am gratified to learn that they have determined through your organization, aided and assisted by their representatives in the County and Town Councils, to establish and sustain this Central Exhibition.

In this country, land is cheap and labor dear, whereas in Europe land is dear and labor cheap, therefore it is evidently our interest in seeking to supply the markets of Europe with such products of the soil as will come in competition with similar articles grown there, to give special attention to those which require the most land and the least labor for their production.

Your people have, therefore, in my opinion, shown wise discrimination and good judgment in giving special attention to the raising and improvement of the various herds of live stock, and to the products of the dairy.

I am happy to be assured that the farmers in this section of Ontario have had their labors awarded by a good harvest, and that all classes enjoy their full share of the happiness and prosperity which is so apparent throughout the Province.

It is most satisfactory to me to know that the policy of the Government and Legislature, in making liberal grants to the agricultural societies throughout the Province, meets with general approbation, and to have before me such a practical illustration of the benefits which have resulted therefrom.

In conclusion, Mr. President and gentlemen, permit me to express my warmest thanks for your cordial reception, and to unite with you in the hope that I may in the future be able to repeat my visit to your annual Central Exhibition.

The President then called for three cheers for the Lieut-Governor, who suitably acknowledged, and who called for cheers for the Queen and Governor-General, which were most heartily responded to.

Those of the Directors who were present were severally introduced to the Lieut-Governor, who chatted quite pleasantly with those present. His Excellency then descended from the stand, and inspected the various classes of horses, which were by this time ordered to be brought forward. He expressed himself delighted with the exhibition made. Afterwards the various prize cattle were brought into the horse ring and met with much admiration from the Governor and party. The Palace having meanwhile been purposely emptied of its vast crowd, the Governor and suite were enabled to inspect the various departments with comfort and advantage. His Excellency spent a considerable time in examining the newly patented Osborn Machine, of the Guelph Sewing Machine Company, the different inventions and improvements of which were lucidly explained by Mr. Osborn, the patentee, and one of the partners of the firm. The Lieut-Governor told Mr. Osborn that he had worked one of the original sewing machines invented some 35 years ago, and remarked on the high state of perfection to which they had been brought since then. His Excellency was also much interested in the lulliput of the Gardner, named the "Governor-General," and also in the Appleton Sewing Machine worked by steam; as also in the knitting machine exhibited by this Company as well as in the one shown by Mrs. Hartley. The Governor spent some time in critically examining the patent springs of Messrs. J. B. Armstrong & Co., and heard the principle of their construction explained and witnessed the great test to which they were subjected. His Excellency then made the tour of the galleries, expressing himself much gratified with what he saw on exhibition in the ladies' department.

When the Governor visited the dairy produce department, it soon became evident that he meant business, for he was speedily at the tank, tasting the butter in the different firms that recommended themselves to his notice, and ultimately fixed on one exhibited by Mr. John Ramsay, of Eden Mills, which he purchased for his private use. Probably he would have made other purchases were it only known that the exhibitors were willing to dispose of their produce. After making an inspection of the remaining outside departments of the Exhibition His Excellency and suite, about half-past 2 p.m., re-entered their carriages, and proceeded and accompanied by the Ventil Horn Band, and the Rifle Company under Capt. Bruce, slowly wended their way from the Exhibition grounds via Upper and Lower Wyndham Streets to the Town Hall, where a Luncheon was prepared in the Council Chamber.

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THE LUNCHEON.

Invitations to the Luncheon were issued to the members of the Town and County Councils, the Directors of the several County and Artillery Companies, the several County Officials, the head of the Island Revenue Department in this District, and the several Members of Parliament.

His Worship the Mayor, Richard Mitchell, Esq., presided, having on his right His Excellency the Lieut-Governor, and on his left the Hon. Archibald McKellar, Minister of Agriculture. Seated on either side of these gentlemen at the principal table were James Laidlaw, Esq., President of the Central Exhibition; Hon. Peter Gow; Messrs. Stirton, M. P., Higginbotham, M. P., Chas. Clarke, M. P., John Mair, Warden, Sheriff Grange, Rev. W. S. Ball, (Chaplain 30th Battalion), C. E. Bowman, District Inspector, Island Revenue, and a large number of the members of the Town and County Councils. At the other tables we observed Judge Kingsmill, Colonel Saunders, Mr. D. Guthrie, Town and County Solicitor, and most of those to whom invitations had been issued, making in all a party of about 90.

The Luncheon itself, was, without exaggeration a truly splendid repast, far eclipsing anything we have ever seen attempted previously in Guelph, and it was the universal testimony of the partakers, that it reflected the utmost honor on those who had the immediate responsibility thereof, as well as infinite credit on the caterer, Mr. W. J. Little, who was ably assisted by professional help from Toronto.

After ample justice had been done to the splendid repast provided, and as the Governor had to return to Toronto by the 3:45 train, the toasts were but few and brief.

The Mayor proposed the health of the Queen, which was responded to with all the honors.

The Mayor then gave the health of the Lieut-Governor, and in doing so alluded to the pleasure it afforded the people of this section to have been honored by his presence in their midst to-day.

The toast was drunk with the greatest enthusiasm, and on His Excellency rising to reply the cheers were loud and prolonged. He thanked them from the bottom of his heart for their kind and for their noble reception, which was indeed quite a surprise to him. He should ever retain a most lively recollection of what he had that day witnessed and of the reception he had received in Guelph. (Loud Cheers.)

His Excellency then briefly proposed the health of the Mayor, who suitably replied, and as the hour for departure had now arrived, the Lieut-Governor, attended by the guests, en masse, left the Council Chamber for the G. T. R. Station, where a special car was attached to the ordinary ones, which were crammed with visitors, and after a short delay, His Excellency having embarked, the train moved off amidst the heartiest cheers of all present.

Thus ended one of the most pleasant and agreeable episodes in the history of our good Town, and must have left a favorable impression on the minds of many thousand spectators who were assembled to witness one of the most successful Exhibitions ever held in Canada.
