New Haven, Conn., July 23.—At the rial of Glione, the Italian padrone, be fore the City Court to-day, four boys tes tified that they had been in this country twenty-one months, and had been kept in the Coosty street den, in New York, until brought to New Haven seven weeks ago. They were beaten and kicked unless they brought in a prescribed sum of money every night, and were told by Glione to steal if they could. The Court held that Glione is guilty of imprisoning free persons, and requires him to farmish bonds for \$4,000 for his appearance before a jury in Ostober. Failing to furnish bonds, Glione was committed to the County jall. The boys will be taken care of by the city authorities until October.

Cincinnati, July 28.—Yesterday Mar shall Boggs, of Greenfield, O., attempted to serve a writ of ejectment on one John-son, who assaulted and inflicted two terrible cuts on Boggs with an axe. Immediately following the explosion a fire broke out totally destroying the large five story brick block, containing a large quantity of fine wines and liquors. The loss cannot at present-be estimated, but it will probably reach \$75,000.

The East End Nuise MAGISTERIAL INVESTIGATION.

Witness kept a cow, but not a pig, and there was no nuisance on his own premises. He had lived there six years but had had no sickness in his family which could be attributed to the distillery.
