HAYES ADDS ANOTHER TO STRING OF WINS DEFEATING DEERS TEN TO ONE

Game Was Played in Drizzling Rain But Hayes Had Control

Chesty Cox Presents a New Centre Fielder by Name of Stadelde, Who Did Well

Pease Back in Bassano; Unie Taking Place Vacated by Pop Wick's Injury

Red Deer, Alta., July 24.—On a slippery ground and in a drizzling rain Red Deer, champions, suffered defeat at the hands of the Bassano Boosters by a one-sided score of 10 to 1. The game was played in the afternoon, being one of the postponed games. It was well that the game was pulled off, as conditions became worse, so that no game could be played in the evening. This was the only game played of the series of three games scheduled.

Dickinson and Hayes were the opposing pitchers, and Hayes had the better of the argument. The ball was slippery and hard to handle, so that many bases on balls were given, Dickinson being the worst offender.

In the seventh inning Bassano got five runs off one hit, coupled with four bases on balls and a hitting of a batter and a wild pitch.

Sullivan made a peculiar decision in this inning, when he allowed Stadelde to score from third and Reddick from second on a wild pitch. Hurley disputed the decision, but did not get any redress. Even Alf Pider, the celebrated baseball authority, who was in the grand stand, could not give the fans any reason for Sullivan's peculiar decision.

Manager Cox presented a new player to the Red Deer fans in the person of Stadelde, who took Person's place in centre field. He did very well, getting two runs, one hit, besides fielding well.

Pease, late of Calgary, was back again in a Bassano uniform, and played third in the place of Wick, who is injured.

Red Deer, Alta., July 24.—Several of the members of the American Olympic team were winners in the games held here today. Melvin Sheppard, of the Irish-American A.C., won the 1,000 metres, establishing a new record of 2:32.9-10 which is 4-10 seconds better than the German record. He was followed by 15 centimetres (near 6 inches) the record for putting the square stone weighing 32-2 pounds, although he had never taken part in this event before. Donald P. Lippincott, University of Pennsylvania, easily defeated the German sprinter, East, in the 200 metres dash.

SPEED KING HERE; MUD ALSO; WET WEATHER MEANS A SLOW RACETRACK

Just Three Hours of Sunshine in All That is Needed to Make Track Fast

Barney Oldfield Put in Yesterday Visiting Old-Time Friends

Calgary Looks the Livest City in Northwest to Those Who Go Fast

JUPITER Pluvius is being implored by all Calgary and surrounding territory to go to sleep or yield some other part of the world before Saturday morning. This is in order that Barney Oldfield and the speed kings, Heinemann and Fritsch, as well as the motorcycle riders, may take part in the big speed and racing exhibitions at Victoria park Saturday afternoon. The track at the local grounds is so fast and of such soil that it will dry out perfectly for racing within three hours of sunshine and that is all that is asked for the racing crew.

Barney Oldfield spent yesterday visiting some old pals around the city and talking with leading citizens regarding racing and other subjects. Everywhere he turned he ran into some friend or acquaintance from some other city around the country, and he gloomily said anything but a gloomy day. Heinemann and Fritsch, working around the city, and by the nightfall everyone knew the speed demons were waiting for the sunshine of Saturday. The rain did not spoil their enthusiasm for Chicago and this territory a bit for even with rain it looked the liveliest city of the north-west to the visitors.

Barney Oldfield has never appeared in the Alberta district, and a crowd of tremendous size is sure to turn out to see the dare-devil performer. The stands are all events put on by the trio of Firestone racers, with their powerful cars, is something that one does not see but few times in a lifetime.
