SWETERS NEEDED FOR NAVY

Assistance Asked From Local Chapter—How to Make Them

The I.O.D.E. has received an appeal for knitted comforts for the navy and they ask the ladies who so kindly knit during the war to again help now by knitting sleeveless sweaters, scarfs, wristlets and socks, but especially sweaters.

Scarfs are knitted one and one-half yards long and 45 stitches wide. Wristlets, 9 inches long with 43 stitches around, plain and purled as the cuff of a sock.

Sailor's sleeveless sweaters—Cast on 76 stitches on 2 needles (with knobs) and knit 2 plain, 2 purled for 3 inches. Then plain knitting for 23 inches. This forms the front. Now knit 24 stitches and put them on another needle for shoulder. Cast off 38 stitches, which will leave opening for neck; knit the remaining 26 stitches for 20 rows (10 ribs) and cast on stitches (85), making 76 stitches once more. Knit plain for 21 inches for back (one inch longer than front), then 2 plain, 2 purled for 3 inches and cast off loosely. To finish neck, pick up 68 stitches round the opening and knit 2 plain, 2 purled round and round on four needles for 8½ inches; cast off loosely, sew up the sides of the sweater, leaving an opening 12 in. long for arm holes and work one row double crochet round the armhole to make it strong.

DEATH OF A YOUNG LADY

Miss Coral I. Lipsey, a Former Resident of Dutton, Passes Away in St. Thomas

The death occurred at her home in St. Thomas on Sunday of Miss Coral I. Lipsey, the only daughter of Mrs. Christena Lipsey, after an illness of several years.

The highly esteemed young lady resided in Dutton for a number of years, where she attended the public school and finally graduated from the high school. For a number of years she held a responsible position with Bradstreet's in Detroit, and was about to be promoted to the head of her department when failing health compelled her to seek relaxation. Four years ago she made her home in St. Thomas.

The late Miss Lipsey possessed a genial and cheerful disposition and her many friends deeply regret her early death.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon at Fairview cemetery and was private, yet many friends of the family assembled at the cemetery, where a short service was conducted by Elder J. B. Stanson.

DEATH OF YARMOUTH RESIDENT

Mrs. Thomson, Sister of Duncan Campbell, Dutton, Passes Away Suddenly

The death occurred Saturday morning at her home on the 18th concession of Yarmouth, of Katharine Campbell Thomson, wife of J. P. Thomson, in her 60th year. Mrs. Thomson's death came very suddenly and unexpectedly. She was in Aylmer on Friday and seemed to be enjoying the very best of health. On her return home she was taken suddenly ill and passed away a few hours later.

Deceased was one of the oldest and most highly respected residents in Yarmouth township. She was born in North Yarmouth and had lived in that locality all her life. She was a consistent member of St. James' Presbyterian church, Yarmouth.

Besides her husband, she leaves to mourn her loss, one daughter, Miss Eva, at home; two sisters, Mrs. Neil McCallum, of London, and Miss Annie Campbell, St. Thomas; and two brothers, Malcolm, in St. Thomas, and Duncan, of Dutton.

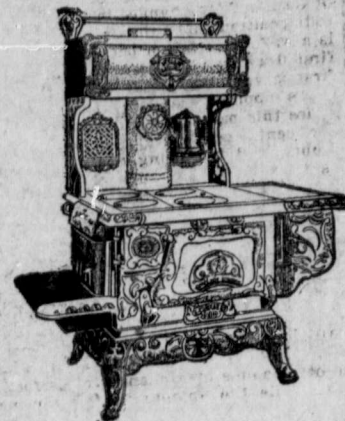
