Terrific Storms.

A Whole Family Prostrated by Lightning.

And Not Likely to Recover—Many Buildings Wrecked and Travel Blocked.

Pittsburg, July 28.—In Allegheny twelve people were struck by lightning. They are in the hospital, and considered by the physicians to be in a critical condition. Almer Hayes, freight receiver of the Fort Wayne road, was standing in the freight house door when a bolt of lightning struck the building, knocking Mr. Hayes unconscious.

Mr. Bennet and his children were standing on their porch on St. Clair Terrace, when a flash was conducted from a trolley wire in front of the house to the porch, prostrating the entire family.

The Snedtz family were eating supper when lightning struck the residence, following the chimney flue to the dining room. About half an hour after a neighbor discovered the whole family lying on the floor in an unconscious condition. They may recover, but it is doubtful.

In Pittsburg reports of damage to property are still coming in. On Washington street two houses, a machine shop and the Fifth United Presbyterian Church were blown down completely, but fortunately no one was injured. The Centenary Methodist Episcopal Church on Kirkpatrick street, had its roof and steeple carried away by the wind, and the bells from the tower were thrown to the ground and broken. The roof of the John Wesley Chapel, S. A. M. E., was torn away and carried 200 feet. The Pittsburg high school and Holy Ghost College suffered somewhat.

Returns from the different sections of the two cities show 25 or 30 people injured more or less by falling trees, roofs, signs, etc.

At West Newton, Pa., on the Baltimore and Ohio, about 30 miles east of here, a landslide 200 feet long and several feet deep is reported on the Baltimore and Ohio tracks at Osceola. Both tracks are reported covered with trees and rocks between here and Griffin station, two miles east.

The watchman of the Penick road at Cedar Creek, two miles east of here, reports eight big landslides there. He says the water came off the hills like rivers, bringing everything with it. He could not get around the slides, and had to cross the river to get here.

Sparks From the Wire.

Frank Brown, the five-year-old son of a farmer living near Macdonald, Man., had both legs cut off by a freight train on Friday evening.

Oscar Hollinger, aged eleven, fell under the wheels of a Canadian Pacific Railway train in the yards at Winnipeg Saturday night, receiving injuries that will likely prove fatal.

Five farmers of the township of Kingston on Thursday night cleared the road of all obstructions in the way of bars and fences at the tollgate in the third concession road, between Cataraugus and the Perth road.

A most brutal assault was committed on a young woman near the bay at Hamilton on Sunday by four or five young men. Miss Alice York, daughter of Mrs. E. York, Wellington street north, was the victim, and she is now in the city hospital, suffering from the injuries she received while protecting her honor.

UTILIZING NIAGARA.

Buffalo's Street Cars Will Use Power Generated by the Cataract.

Buffalo N. Y., July 28.—Contracts have been signed to cover all of the apparatus and machinery necessary for the transformation, transmission and delivery of 1,000 horse-power to the lines of the Buffalo Railway Company in this city by the Niagara Falls Power Company, and contracts have been signed whereby the Buffalo Railway company becomes the first consumer in this city to use the electric power generated at the Falls. The power may be delivered in Buffalo before the end of next November. The corporation operates all the street cars run in the city of Buffalo.

Today's Ottawa.

Occupations of the New Members of Parliament.

Sir Donald Smith Confers With the Premier and Returns to London.

The Conservative Leader Called to Toronto to Consider Protest Matters.

OCCUPATIONS OF MEMBERS.

Ottawa, July 28.—Complete returns give the following as the occupations of the members of the new House of Commons: There are 63 lawyers, 23 farmers, 28 merchants, 21 physicians, 19 gentlemen, 12 manufacturers, 10 journalists, 8 mill owners, 3 contractors, 3 real estate agents, 2 surveyors, 1 veterinary surgeon, 1 township clerk, 2 distillers, 1 financial agent, 1 insurance manager, 1 banker, 1 shipowner, 1 rancher, 1 oil refiner, 1 printer and 1 civil engineer. The lawyers and gentlemen combined form nearly two-fifths of the whole House, so that the outlook is poor for the honest toilers who make up the remainder. Col. Donville, Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Postock are returned as farmers, and Messrs. Wallace, McMullen, Penny, Tucker, Bain, Charlton, Foran, Stenson, Heston, Brooker, Blanchard, Scriven, Sutherland and Kaubach as gentlemen. To these have been added Mr. Foster, Mr. Cassidy, Mr. Beattie, Mr. Beattie and Sir Richard Cartwright, who are not labeled with any occupation, and are therefore entitled to be classed as gentlemen. Of the nineteen gentlemen out of a total of 213.

GOVERNMENT PROGRAMME.

Among the many midsummer yarns circulated as to the intentions of the Government, one having its origin in the small mind of some man bent on making trouble is that the Government Printing Bureau is to be abolished. This is not true. The subject has not been discussed. The Printing Bureau will not be abolished. The Government have been credited with many intentions. They were even said to be considering the Pacific cable scheme, a matter that is merely on paper, that was proposed as a subject for a conference in London. The conference has been a fiasco. Sir Mackenzie Bowell has returned from it, and his trip was a vain thing, unless he went to get out of the general election. The cleaning up of twenty departments, the reformation of the tariff, immigration, extension of trade, development of the Northwest, the redistribution of the constituencies, the subject of the franchise, the reform of the Senate and the settlement of the school question are all matters pressing for attention, and sufficient in themselves to occupy the time of any Government without the circulation of the statement that the Ministry was busy with the laying of a cable under the Pacific Ocean. That subject may be considered, but if so, it will be in its proper place among the non-pressing matters to be dealt with at leisure.

MR. SOMERVILLE'S SEAT.

The presence in the city today of Mr. James Somerville, M.P. for North Brant, causes an evening paper to say that Mr. Somerville will resign his seat in favor of the Minister of Customs. Mr. Somerville has been making a personal inspection of the Canadian immigration agencies in Great Britain, intimating that he will prepare a report for the department while here.

GOES BACK.

Sir Donald Smith, High Commissioner, came up to Ottawa yesterday afternoon and had a long conference with the Premier. He will return to his post in London on Saturday.

THAT LITTLE TRIP.

Mr. T. M. Daly, late Minister of the Interior, has written the department stating that he will be in the capital today. Mr. Daly, who has been making a personal inspection of the Canadian immigration agencies in Great Britain, intimating that he will prepare a report for the department while here.

NOTES.

There is no truth in the report that the position of superintendent of the Niagara Canal has been filled. The Government cannot get at such business for some weeks yet.

Sir Charles Tupper left last night for Toronto on urgent party business. Protest troubles will be discussed.

A personal friend of Dr. Montague's says that when he left Ottawa, less than a week ago, it was his intention to resign the practice of his profession. He talked of locating in Ottawa, but was not decided on that point.

Hon. Wm. Patterson says that he has never had an idea of seeking a seat in Saskatchewan. He will sit for an Ontario constituency.

Sir Adolphe Caron has been served with an official notification of the protest of his election for Three Rivers and St. Maurice.

The elections in Quebec County, Levis, Montmagny and Kamouraska are to be held on Wednesday evening. The necessary steps have been taken to that effect.

CUBAN SUCCESSES.

Surrender of a Spanish Fort and Garrison—Soldiers Joining Insurgents.

New York, July 27.—The Herald, Havana, says: The fort at Ciego, Montero, near Diego, San Clara Province, surrendered to the rebel chief, Aulet, on the 11th instant, without firing a shot in defense. The Spanish garrison joined the insurgent ranks, delivering to the rebel leader 16 Mauser rifles and 8,000 rounds of ammunition. In Puerto Principe and Pinar Del Rio, many desertions from the Spanish columns are reported. Every effort, however, is officially made to suppress names.

The Government is beginning to reap the fruit of its failure to pay the troops since February. Discontent continues to increase daily.

Under the Queen's Regent's announcement of amnesty yesterday a British political suspect, was released at Atenas.

Havana, July 28.—An important engagement has been fought between Gen. Linarez and the insurgent forces under Calixto Garcia, in which the Spanish losses were admittedly heavy. The insurgents took an offensive movement by attempting to turn the right wing of the Spanish column. They attacked with vigor, and hard fighting occurred. They made an obstinate stand, and the Spanish forces, before the opposition of the Spanish, the attack was finally repulsed by a bayonet charge by the Spanish. The insurgent position was then taken, and at the same time they were flanked, and put to flight.
