THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 8—11 p.m.—The

storm over the Straits of Mackinac last

night has since passed off our Atlantic

coast, and the pressure is now much above

its average over the greater portion of the

continent and highest over the Northwest

and Middle States. A fresh westerly gale

blew over the lakes during last night and

this morning, and today strong winds and

gales have been general throughout Eastern

Canada. In the Northwest the weather has

been fine and cold.

Minneapolis, 18° below zero-24°; Port

Arthur, 12°-20°; Toronto, 32°-34°; Mon-

other grocers who store sugar here, on the

ground that they have no place of business

within the municipality. The contesting

grocers appealed in the first place to Judge

Elliot, but he promptly refused to interfere

with the Court of Revision. The parties

not being satisfied paid under protest and

sued the city to recover back, and have

now succeeded with costs. The city has

been getting into too many unsuccessful

suits in recent years.
