The great conspiracy of the Dominion
Government—to win seats where
ever possible—succeeded in two out
of three elections held yesterday.
Shocking, is it not?

Among those who voted for Mr.
Heyd in South Brant yesterday was
Squire Thompson, one of the pioneers
of Liberalism in Canada, who in 1837
was imprisoned for the advocacy of
responsible government. All honor to
the veteran!

Mr. George E. Foster is the El Mah-
di of Canada. He prophesied that
Cornwall and Stormont would be car-
ried by the Conservatives, and the
Liberal nominee swept the constitu-
ency by 599 majority, and in Winnipeg
the other day he was quite sure all
three ridings which voted yesterday
would declare for Sir Charles Tupper.
Mr. Foster must be Sir Charles Tupper.

Yesterday's Elections.

The Dominion bye-elections on
Thursday must have afforded great
encouragement to the men in power
at Ottawa.

South Brant, which was carried by
Mr. Henry at the general election by
means which he was afraid to have
revealed in the election court, has re-
turned to the Liberal column by a de-
cisive majority. Mr. Heyd, the Lib-
eral candidate, put up a strong fight,
and was ably assisted by Hon. Wm.
Paterson, who would not have been
defeated in June if he had not de-
voted so much time to aid outside
constituencies to the neglect of his
own. Premier Laurier and Premier
Hardy also spoke in Brantford, and,
no doubt, did much by their arguments
to increase the vote. In Mr. Heyd the
historic riding will have an able re-
presentative.

In North Ontario, Mr. Graham, the
Liberal-Patron candidate, who was
cheated out of his seat by ballot-
stuffing in June, is elected. The ma-
jority for him ought to have been
larger, but it will do.

East Simcoe has apparently re-elected
Mr. Bennett, the Conservative can-
didate, by a decreased majority. Mr.
Bennett is a persuasive orator, and as
he permitted himself to be uneaten
on an unimportant proof of bribery,
he pleaded for sympathy, and, no
doubt, got many votes as a conse-
quence. A good deal of money is also
reported to have been spent in his be-
half.

The Government must be well satis-
fied with the results of Thursday's
polling, however. There is a Liberal
gain of two seats out of three, repre-
senting four on a division, and that,
too, in the face of the shameful mis-
representation of Premier Laurier by
Mr. Foster, nominal leader of the Op-
position.

It is apparent that the new Admin-
istration is in power to stay. Its op-
ponents may just as well make up
their minds to accept the situation and
aid in the patriotic task of develop-
ing this great country and improving
the condition of its people, which Hon.
Mr. Laurier and his colleagues have
set before them.

Eight on a Division.

The Dominion Government has cap-
tured four seats from the Opposition
since June 23, representing eight votes
on a division in the House. This is a
good beginning. London must get in
to the procession at the earliest pos-
sible opportunity.

Political Straws.

Dominion elections held since the
general election on June 23:
North Grey—Liberal majority, 400—
largely increased.

Queen's and Sunbury, N. B.—Liberal
majority, 622—largely increased.

Brandon, Man.—Given to the Lib-
erals by acclamation. Never before
was a Liberal returned in Brandon.
Saskatchewan—No Conservative was
put in the field, though the seat prior
to June 23 was always held by a Con-
servative.

Cornwall and Stormont—Liberal ma-
jority, 599. This constituency was Con-
servative prior to the bye-election
since before 1873.

South Brant—Liberal majority, over
400. At general election Mr. Henry,
Conservative, carried this constituency
by a majority of 51.

North Ontario—Carried by the Lib-
eral. A Conservative was returned at
the general election.

East Simcoe—Conservative majority
much reduced.

That is a pretty good six months' record for the new Administration at
Ottawa.

And the end is not yet.

One of the most interesting num-

Canadian Cattle and the Abolished Quarantine.

Premier Laurier's recent utterances
in regard to the benefits to Canadian
cattle raisers accruing from the agree-
ment entered into between the Gov-
ernments of Canada and the United
States have excited widespread inter-
est, and we are in receipt of numerous
queries as to the full extent of the re-
lief thus afforded.

In the first place, all cattle for
breeding purposes are free of duty.
Then the vexatious quarantine regu-
lations are entirely removed. It was
unprofitable for Canadians to send cat-
tle to the Buffalo, Boston and other
markets, while cattle had to remain in
quarantine for 90 days before they
could be sold.

With cattle free from this regula-
tion, Canadian cattle are now in de-
mand at Buffalo, and last week the
number of Canadian animals market-
ed at that point was largely increased.
Superintendent McHugh, of the G.T.R.,
has expressed his belief that this traf-
fic will be largely increased as a con-
sequence of the removal of the quar-
antine.

Another benefit is the increased
steamship competition for freight.
When the quarantine was in force,
Canadian cattle could not be shipped
by way of United States ports, even
when space was scarce at Montreal.
Now vessels trading to Canadian
ports will have to provide ample space
at competitive rates, or Canadian ship-
pers will send their animals by way
of Boston, Portland or New York.

Hon. Mr. Fisher, Minister of Agri-
culture, deserves praise for the prompt-
itude with which he has set-
tled this vexatious question in the
interest of Canadian farmers.

BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

Summary of Dun & Co's Weekly
Statement.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 5.—R. G. Dun
& Co's weekly statement of trade in
Canada says:

Montreal trade has not picked up
as it was hoped it might when the
snow came.
The business situation at Toronto
is apparently without change. The
slight improvement in wholesale prices
as reported last week continues. The
unsettled condition of the woolen trade
in consequence of the financial diffi-
culties of several manufacturers
came unexpectedly and put a damper
on trade. A fair business in spring
goods is being done, while sorting up
orders in heavy goods have been more
numerous, the result of seasonal
weather.

Last night the annual meeting of the

S. Dewar, in the chair, and the fol-

After the election of new members,
the annual report of W. Bro. Parker,
secretary-treasurer, was read and

and the report was unanimously

by a standing vote:

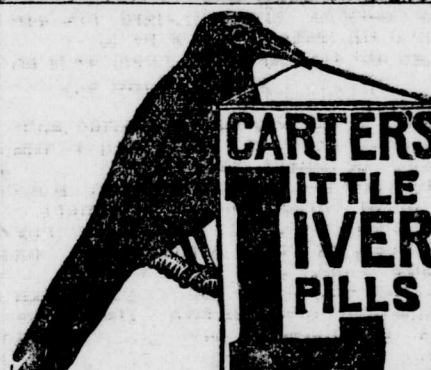
"The removal to Toronto of R. W.
