Were Given a Rousing Reception and Serenaded.

Started for Quebec Along With the Queen City Contingent-Notes by the Way.

Toronto, Oct. 26.-The London com-We cannot refrain from praising the beauties of our

Toronto, Oct. 26.—The London country of the contingent for South Africa arrived here last evening, and found the Toronto company at the Union station awaiting them. The boys were given a rousing reception, and were given a rousing reception, and were serenaded by the Queen's Own Band. The two companies left for Quebec to-

The departure of the Toronto district company of the Transvaal contingent was made the occasion of a demonstration absolutely unequaled in the history of the city. Fully 100,000 people assembled along the line of march. As the soldiers passed along they were greeted with an outburst of tremendous cheers and patriotic cries, mingled with the greetings of their friends. The scene in the armories, before the men marched out, was most affecting. Their relatives had been given tickets Col. E. G. Rathbone, who is in of admission to the armories, that they might say good-bye there, and while the city regiments mustered for the parade in honor of the volunteers, the women folks of the departing soldiers clung to them and said their farewell words amid tears. Patriotic addresses were delivered by Mayor Shaw and other members of the council, and afterwards the souvenir silver match boxes and other gifts of the citizens were presented to the men. Prayers were then said by Rev. Arthur H. Baldwin and the chaplains of the various regiments, after which the march to the station began.

The city's gift to the contingent consists of £25 to each officer and £5 to

each man, supplemented in the latter case by 10 shillings to each man by Ald. Hallam. The life of every member of the contingent is insured for \$1,000 at the expense of the citizens' committee, and the relatives of the volunteers will be cared for during their absence when necessary. At the Union station, when the train moved out, the enthusiastic people broke all bounds. Barriers were thrown down, women fainted and a vast crowd surged into the station, covering the plat-forms, besieging the train, while old voterans of former wars crowded-around, praying to be taken with the contingent. The volunteers left amid the cheers of thousands.

# PHILIPPINE

Large Numbers Again Threaten Calamba-Macabebes Want to Enter he U. S. Army

Manila, Oct. 26.—The funeral of Maj. Guy Howard, son of Gen. O. O. Howard, killed Oct. 22 near Arayat, took place yesterday. The body was placed on the transport Belgian King.

Insurgents have returned to the vi-cinity of Calamba increased in numbers and are surrounding the town on land sides. Gen. Blanco's 400 Macabebes are re-

turning from the Ladrones. It is be-lieved they are desirous of entering the American army and completing the regiment of Macabebes.
At San Isidro 30 hours' rain has raised the river and supplies are arriving in canoes of natives.

Gen. Otis reports the arrival at Manila of the transport Grant, with the 26th 'volunteers and the Aztec with civilian employes. The Aztec lost seven of its cargo of horses on the trip.

sylvania leave 'Frisco for Portland to embark the 40th regiment and part of the 39th, and upon sailing for Manila

Col. E. G. Rathbone, who is in charge of the postal service in Cuba, arrived in New York from Havana yesterday. He says the postal service of Cuba has been thoroughly reorganized, and bankers and merchants of Cuba now send remittances averaging at least \$150,000 a day by mail. Cubans are being given the jobs as far as possible.

CYLINDER KNOCKED OUT. St. Thomas, Oct. 26 .- A startling acyesterday morning. The bolt connecting the driving-rod to the crank-pin broke, allowing the piston to knock out the head of the cylinder. A terrific re-port was the result, and the head of the cylinder was knocked about 40 feet, into an oil house. Fortunately no person was hurt. The first engineer, Mr. Roberts, escaped by jumping through a window. Mr. R. N. Price, foreman of the mill, and Mr. Corey were standing about four feet from the spot where the head of the cylinder The difficulty experienced was in getting the steam shut off, as in a very few minutes it had filled both engine and boiler rooms, loosening the cement on a number of belts. It will be necessary to send the high-pressure cylinder to Galt for repairs. JAMESON'S SCOUT:
