HER INSURANCE MONEY IS GONE

Some Seven Hundred Dollars of It Taken by Husband No. 2.

Detroit, Nov. 21.—It was reported at the home of Mrs. Charles R. Holmes, who says she was drugged, robbed and deserted in Windsor, Ont., on the night of her wedding by her false husband, that she was much improved and would recover. She is extremely nervous, however, over her strange experience.

Vernon, Mich., Nov. 19.—Mrs. Charles R. Holmes, formerly Mrs. Hattie E. Norton, of Vernon, Mich., who was married, drugged and robbed at Windsor, is an old resident of Vernon, Mich., having lived at Vernon about twenty years, and is well known and highly respected by all that know her. She has a very comfortable home of her own, and a grown-up family of five children, three boys and two girls. About two years ago she lost her husband by death and received \$1,000 insurance. The \$700 she lost at Windsor was the insurance money she received through her husband's death.

TWO TRAGIC EVENTS.

Canesara, N. Y., Nov. 21.—Alfred E. Herne was struck by an Erie train at South Church street crossing last night, and instantly killed. He was 32 years old. When his widow was notified of her husband's death she went violently insane, and has continued a raving maniac ever since.

FIRST RAINFALL IN EIGHT YEARS

San Francisco, Nov. 21.—Capt. Carter of the schooner Volant, from Magdalena Bay, Lower California, reports that the first rain that has fallen at Magdalena in eight years fell while he was there. This place is one of the most arid in the world, being between the northern and southern rain belts. It has one of the best harbors in the Pacific coast, and is a favorite place for target practice by American warships.

PRINCE TUAN UNDER ARREST

Considerable Firing Heard in the Vicinity of Tien Tsin.

Allies Resolved to Resort to More Vigorous Measures in China.

Berlin, April 21.—A special dispatch from Pekin says that Prince Tuan has been arrested and stripped of power by order of the emperor and empress dowager, but that fears are felt of Gen. Tung Puh Siang, who, with 16,000 regulars, is in Hu Jang Pu.

Government officials, says a New York Times dispatch from Washington, no longer make any attempt to conceal their disbelief in the sincerity of the protestations made by the powers that they do not contemplate the partition of China.

FIGHTING NEAR TIEN TSIN.

Tien Tsin, Nov. 20, via Shanghai, Nov. 21.—There has been considerable firing recently in the neighborhood of Tien Tsin, and owing to a report that the German quarter of the city would be attacked last night, the German troops were held in readiness for action at an instant's notice. Nothing happened, however, to show cause for the alarm.

Today all the Chinese servants of the Bengal Lancers' officers and men left saying that they had been informed that the Boxers were marching in a large body on Tien Tsin and Pekin.

Neither Gen. Lorne Campbell, of the British troops, nor Col. Moale, of the Americans, believes there is any truth in the rumor, but the natives evidently believe it, and many of them are leaving the service of the foreigners.

COL. YORK WAITING REINFORCEMENTS.

Berlin, Nov. 21.—Count Von Waldersee cables from Pekin that he has advice from Col. York's corps showing that the Chinese General Ho, with 10,000 regular troops and much artillery, is getting a further advance of the expedition. Col. York therefore will await reinforcements before attempting to proceed.

London, Nov. 21.—"At last," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post, "the allies in Pekin have solved upon stronger measures to bring matters to a crisis. They have asked the viceroy of Nankin to state definitely his position toward the Chinese court, and the question of forwarding supplies."

"It is credibly reported," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, under yesterday's date, that the emperor's messenger has telegraphed a secret decree to all governors and viceroys to prepare for immediate war against the allies everywhere."

ANOTHER EXPEDITION.

The German war office has received the following telegram from Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee: "A detachment, consisting of two companies of infantry, a force of mounted men and two guns, under command of Maj. Muhlenfels, has been dispatched, via Kia Tien, 21 kilometers west of Pekin, with orders to push on to the great wall. The column arrived at Hsueh Hwa Fu Nov. 17. On returning Col. York will establish communication with Major Muhlenfels."

RUSSIAN VIEWS.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 21.—Readers of Russian newspapers cannot avoid regarding the close parallelism between the views of the German Socialists newspapers on the Chinese question. The Russian anticipates the United States with antagonize the Anglo-German programme.

Russia is retrenching on account of the Russian troubles. The proposed increase in the appropriations for popular schools in 1901 will not be made.

VON BUELOW DEFENDS THE KAISER.

Berlin, Nov. 21.—Count Von Buelow, imperial chancellor, replying to Herr Richter of the reichstag yesterday, said: "Prince Von Hohenlohe was much impressed by the article in the Freisinnige Zeitung, which contended that it was advisable to assemble the reichstag. I am betraying no secret when I say that I am one of those who saw very serious and important reasons for summoning it." Referring to Herr Richter's criticism of Emperor William's speeches, Count Von Buelow declared: "I accept the full responsibility for them. The speech of Bremerhaven was extemporaneous, delivered at a time when it was assumed that all the Europeans at Pekin had been murdered. It was natural in such circumstances that the Kaiser should have spoken as a soldier and not as a diplomat."

AT WASHINGTON.

Washington, Nov. 21.—The Chinese situation was the main topic under consideration at yesterday's cabinet meeting. The administration was disposed to join with other governments in making demands upon the Chinese imperial authorities which the Chinese government cannot comply with. So far as the United States government is advised, the foreign ministers at Pekin have not yet agreed upon all points under discussion. It may be stated, however, that the United States government purposes not to be driven out of the concert relative to China until all proper interests of the United States in China shall have been conserved.

BABY ELEPHANT AT BARABOO.

Baraboo, Wis., Nov. 21.—A baby elephant weighing 200 pounds was born here yesterday morning. The people in the vicinity are much interested.

WITH 140 TRUNKS.

New York, Nov. 20.—Madame Bernhardt, who arrived here yesterday, looked in the best of health. She said she was glad to revisit this country, as she expected to write a great deal of America. In her memoirs, the actress denied that Rostand was insane, and asserted that the stories to that effect had been circulated by the author's enemies. Mme. Bernhardt brought over with her 30 pieces of personal baggage and 140 trunks containing her stage costumes.

YET ANOTHER TEXAS CYCLONE

The Towns of Columbia and La Grange Visited.

A Score of Persons Killed and Large Amount of Damage Done.

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 21.—A special to the Age-Herald by long distance telephone from Columbia, Tenn., says: A terrific cyclone, moving in a westerly and northwesterly direction, struck this place at 9:30 o'clock last night, and left havoc in its path. The northern and western sections of the city, populated by negroes, was almost entirely swept away. Fifteen persons are known to have been killed, and it is feared that this number will be largely increased by later reports.

THE DEAD.

The dead are: Misses Florence and Evelyn Farrel, Capt. A. F. Aydolette, wife and one son; another son and daughter missing; Miss Kate Forsythe, James Cherry and six negroes, names unknown.

The cyclone lasted for five minutes, and its path, about a thousand feet wide, is clearly marked by devastation. Many houses, including a large number of negro cabins, were blown down and many others unroofed. A freight train on the Nashville, Florence and Sheffield Railroad was lifted from the track, but as far as reported no one was injured.

LA GRANGE SUFFERS.

Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 21.—A tornado struck the town of La Grange, Tenn., 45 miles east of Memphis, on the Southern Railroad, yesterday evening, and as a result not a church is left standing except the Episcopal.

The streets are littered with the debris of destroyed buildings, merchandise, telegraph and telephone wires, and poles. Several persons are dead and injured.

The dead recovered up to the time the correspondent left on a night train to bring the report to Memphis are: Walter L. Moody, assistant manager of the Panky & Galtner Paving and Manufacturing Company; wife of Brown May, colored; unknown negro woman.

A deluge of rain was falling when the cyclone came, but its advance was foretold by a roaring, rushing sound, followed by heavy reports, which gave the inhabitants warning, and they rushed out from the falling structures.
