Hear-Kept Time by Eyesight Alone. NEW YORK, Jan. 19. - Two hundred deaf mutes dancing to music of which they could not hear a single note formed a notable feature of a ball held Wednesday night in the Central Opera House, in East Sixty-seventh street. It was the fifth an-nual ball of the Deaf Mutes' Union League, an organization composed of graduates and pupils of the Greene School, at Lexington avenue and Sixty-seventh street. To all outward appearance it was just an ordinary dance, with the usual accessories of orchestra and waxed floor, but an observant person, with good ears, could tell in

a minute that something was missing. The merry chatter of men and women that fills the corridors and the ballroom itself between dances was all there, but in a strange form. It had a rarified metallic sound-was artificial-like the talk of

cleverly-designed outomat. If you had entered the courtroom with your ears covered, everything would have seemed natural to you. There were the indolent men lolling about with cigarettes between their lips and trying their best to look bored, and the bashful men, who did not know what to do with their hands, and kept casting sheepish glances at the door of the cleakroom across the hall, whence pretty faces and dainty gowns were emerg-

ing every now and then.

So far as the eye could tell, these men were all talking more or less, but just as soon as you allowed yourself to listen the illusion was dispelled, utterance intelligible to the person of ordinary senses was very scarce. Yet these polite gentlemen in faultless evening dress understood each other perfectly, and laughed heartily at the visible speech, jokes and sign language guying that were flying back and forth.
