## Royal Templars' Meeting.

Mr. W. W. Buchanan, of Hamilton, the well-known temperance worker, and editor of the Templar, is expected to be present at the Royal Templar Council at Somerset Hall this evening, to take charge of the initiation of new candidates and conferring the insurance degree on some 30 candidates who have already passed the physician's examination. Mr. Buchanan is probably the highest authority on the Royal Templar work in Canada. He will give an explanatory address regarding the work at this evening's meeting. Persons desiring to become members will do well to attend early as the meeting will be open for business at 7:30 o'clock.

## Sons of England.

At the last regular meeting of Kensington Lodge, No. 66, Sons of England Benevolent Society, held in Albert Hall, London West, Past President Bro. Wm. Tyler was requested to step forward and was presented with a handsome past president's jewel. The presentation was made by the president, Bro. R. Bartlett, who made a very effective address to the able and courteous manner in which Bro. Tyler had filled the president's chair for two years, speaking also of the rapid growth Kensington Lodge has made in members and finances under his able guidance. Bro. Tyler, although taken by surprise, made a suitable reply, thanking the officers and members for their kind token of esteem and wishing the lodge continued prosperity. The brother who had just made his debut in the lodge, Bro. Tyler, was elected to attend the coming meeting of the Grand Lodge in Toronto. After spending a pleasant half hour in songs, etc., the lodge closed at 10 o'clock.

## Educational.

No. 2 committee of the Board of Education met last evening, there being present Messrs. Stephenson, Turner, Greenless, McElheran and Chairman Blackwell. A large number of accounts amounting to \$132.44 were passed. An application from Wm. Ruse for an increase in his salary as janitor of the Askin street school was laid over. Ten gallons of Jeyes' disinfectant fluid was ordered to be obtained. The roof of the Simcoe street school is to be repaired at a cost of \$15. A motion was passed condemning the irregular proceedings of the other committees in ordering goods, and the attention of the board will be called to the same. An order for a number of benches, etc., for use in the Collegiate Institute was also passed. Specifications will also be prepared for the work necessary at the Collegiate Institute in arranging reading rooms and a museum, and tenders will be called for the same.

## Workmen in Ward One.

The workmen of the first ward assembled in Cullis' hall, Wellington street, last night to organize a legislative club. The interest taken in the movement in the southern portion of the city was evidenced when a club for No. 3 was organized in the hall some weeks ago, but the attendance last night was much larger. Mr. T. C. Thornhill was chosen chairman, and among the speakers were Messrs. Joseph T. Marks, H. B. Ashplant, John M. Parsons and John Barber. All spoke strongly in favor of the aims of the organization. Ald. Parnell dropped in when the meeting was well advanced and was called on for an address. He expressed himself as heartily in accord with the workmen of the city in their efforts to secure the rights for

which they contend. Ald. Parnell also said he was opposed to exemptions of any kind, in favor of the city operating its own street railway and, though the labor day was sufficient for any person. He also condemned the action taken by the aldermen in the free library question. The election of representatives to the executive resulted in the choice of Messrs. Geo. Wrigley, sen.; John M. Parsons and W. H. Gough.

## THE LUCKY ONES.

Tenders Accepted for Supplies for Works

—The Stone Crusher Again.

Tenders for supplies for various works to come under the supervision of No. 2 during the year occupied the attention of the committee at last night's meeting. The supplies tendered for were nails, lumber, sewer pipe and plank sidewalks. Followed the successful bidders:

Nails—James Cowan & Co., at \$2.65 per keg for No. 1 wire, and \$2.20 for three-inch.

Plank sidewalks—There were four tenders for this work, and that of W. W. Willis & Co. was accepted, the figures being: Three foot, 12 cents per foot; 4 foot, 17½ cents; 5 foot 4 inches, 25½ cents; 6 foot, 27½ cents; 7 foot, 29½ cents; 8 foot, 32½ cents; 9 foot, 35 cents; 10 foot, 37 cents; 12 foot, 43 cents; 14 foot, 49 cents. All tenders were very close.

Lumber (all sizes)—S. H. Craig, at \$14 per 1,000 feet.

Sewer pipe—Of the three tenders for sewer pipe but one was accompanied by the necessary check, and as there appeared to be a misunderstanding in the matter the secretary will return the tenders and give the owners an opportunity to supply the checks.

A tender was also accepted for a supply of a patent preservative of board sidewalks, but the article will be used only at the option of the engineer.

At the next meeting of the committee tenders for street sweeping will be let.

W. J. Austin and W. Richards, on behalf of the Knights of Sherwood Forest and the Juvenile Foresters respectively, applied for the use of the agricultural hall for two nights a week for drill purposes, until the opening of the fair. For the last year or so the hall has been granted free, but this year the committee considered the advisability of fixing a fee.

Ald. Garratt moved that the city supply an electric light and remove and replace the fixtures, and charge 40 cents a night. Carried.

Engineer Graydon suggested that some steps be taken in regard to the lane in rear of the wholesale block on the west side of Richmond street between King and York, and the lane in rear of some buildings on the east side of Richmond, near King street. The owners had refused to improve them, and they were in a filthy condition. It was referred to the council.

In reply to a communication from the city engineer, Mr. Keating, of Toronto, stated that the Queen City was under the frontage tax system. All sewers, improvements, and sidewalks were charged for in that way. Filed for reference.

The specifications for the new stone crusher were approved of with slight amendments and tenders will be called for.

## AT LAST!

Daniel Coughlin is Once More a Free Man—Close on an Eventful Era in His History.

CHICAGO, March 8.—Daniel Coughlin is a free man to-night. For the first time since the morning of May 18, 1889, when he was stripped of his detective's star and placed under arrest, he enjoys the precious boon of personal liberty. Once convicted of murder and conspiracy, consigned by the verdict of the jury to the penitentiary for the term of his natural life, granted a new trial as the result of errors in the previous proceedings; brought back from Joliet after three years of incarceration, a jury of his peers this afternoon declared as the outcome of a second trial that has occupied four months and four days, that he had neither part nor parcel in the assassination of Dr. Patrick Henry Cronin.

The jury retired on the stroke of 11 o'clock, and shortly before 4 o'clock came to an agreement. When the clerk read the verdict: "We find the defendant, Daniel Coughlin, not guilty," for a moment not a soul stirred. Then came a cheer. A hundred throats joined in and pandemonium prevailed, no effort being made by the court attaches to maintain decorum.

Coughlin seemed stunned as the words fell from the clerk's lips. Then by an effort he arose from his seat, pushed back the crowd, and exclaimed in triumphant tones, "Boys, justice has come at last." The crowd gave an answering cheer. Pausing for a moment to wring the hand of his father, Coughlin jumped into the jury box and thanked every man in turn, while the tears streamed down his face.

In the meantime Coughlin's faithful little wife had heard the news and hurried to the court room. Coughlin was about to pass out through the judges' chamber, when a cry was raised by 100 voices "Dan, Dan, come back; here's your wife." The ex-detective turned just in time to catch his helpmeet, as sobbing and half-fainting, she fell into his arms. After waiting some time for the crowd to disperse, Coughlin, his wife and father managed to reach a carriage and were driven to the home that the ex-detective had left four years ago.

## STEAMER IN DISTRESS!

Damaged in a Collision—Out of Coal and Burning Her Woodwork for Fuel.

St. Johns, Nfld., March 8.—The steamer Briscoe, long overdue at New York, is reported 40 miles off Cape Race by vessels arriving to-day. The Briscoe's bow was stove in by collision. Her coal is gone, and she was trying to reach port by burning her woodwork. Tugs started to her aid immediately as the salvage will be considerable.

## THE LAST OF "LONG JIM."

While Staggering Under a Load of Liquor He Fell and Broke His Neck.

NIAGARA FALLS, March 8.—While James Ford, better known as "Long Jim," was on his way home about 1 o'clock this afternoon under the influence of liquor he stumbled in a hole while staggering along side some cars on the M. C. R. transfer track back of the Waverly Hotel, falling about eight or ten feet over the embankment, breaking his neck. He stood 6 feet 7½ inches, and was as thin as he was tall. He leaves a wife and three small children.
