TWO NEW PLAYERS.

Toronto, March 19.—President Apple-
gath, of the Toronto Baseball Club,
today received word from Manager
Gardner that he had signed a couple
of new players for the champions.
They are James McCloskey, an infield-
er from the Homestead, Pa., club, and
Jesse Hall, an outfielder from Three-
1 League. McCloskey is the shortstop
who reported to the Buffalo club last
spring, and after a stay of a couple of
days, "jumped" the club without wait-
ing for a trial. Manager Stallings tried
to get him again this year, but Man-
ager Gardner got to the youngster
first. Hall is said to be a catcher. The
two new players of the Toronto club
has nineteen players, including five
infielders and five outfielders, under
contract. It is certain that the club
will captain the team. Gardner says
that Jimmy Miller will certainly play
with Toronto, reports from Cincinnati
to the contrary notwithstanding. Al-
though the club has six pitchers un-
der contract, several others will be
secured. There is a probability that
"Pop" Williams, who was with To-
ronto for four seasons, and who last
year pitched for the Chicago team, will
return to the local club this year.
