Reports Show Progress, Financially and Otherwise.

Encouraging State of Affairs Revealed at the Annual Meeting-Election of Officers.

The eighth annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held at the city hall last night, when very gratifying reports were submitted by Secretary and Inspector Sanders and Treasurer J. I. A. Hunt. The latter's report showed that two years ago the balance was \$10 29; last year \$55 98, and this year \$121 66. Only \$76 had been collected so far this year, whereas at the same time last year over \$500 had been collected. He also referred to the society's loss by the death of two or its members—Mrs. E. W. Hyman and Mrs. G. B. Harris. The interest of the latter in the society was further evidenced by a subscription of \$300. Speaking of the shelter home, he desired to say that the society had entered the home without a dollar to pay on the purchase, and not a dollar situation. During the past month, however, \$500 has been subscribed, and the City Council has promised an additional grant of \$250 on presentation of a bona fide subscription list of \$1,000. This the society hopes to do, and by the presentation of a second list next year, free the shelter from debt.

She said that the London society was one of four of the most flourishing, progressive and vigorous societies in the province. She knew of but one that did a larger work. The society was congratulated on the two excellent reports presented, its active The society was congratulated on the two excellent reports presented, its active band of officers and workers, the City Council, whose members were intelligent, practical men, interested in the work of the society; the police magistrate, who had shown sympathy in the work, and the scope the society enjoyed, London being a progressive and growing city. Mrs. Harvie dealt with a number of suggestions made in Mr. Sanders' report, and gave some of the causes why the work of the society was necessary—there being little religious and moral training in our homes, the shiftlessness of fathers and mothers, and desertion by parents.
