## A YEAR OF GRATIFYING PROSPERITY

Admirable Work of the Children's Aid Society

Reports Show Progress, Financially and Otherwise.

Encouraging State of Affairs Revealed at the Annual Meeting--Election of Officers.

The eighth annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held at the city hall last night, when very gratifying reports were submitted by Secretary and Inspector Sanders and Treasurer J. A. Hunt. The latter's report showed that two years ago the balance was \$10.23; last year \$55.95, and this year \$121.66. Only \$76 had been collected so far this year, whereas at the same time last year over \$500 had been collected. He felt that the difference between \$76 and \$500 was as good as being in the society's record of splendid work. During the past year the society placed the following number of children in foster homes, namely: Boys 12, girls 17. Of these there were returned to the shelter one boy and two girls, leaving 11 boys and 15 girls in the homes in which they were placed during the year. The three children returned were taken back for a variety of reasons. The society has now in foster homes, Boys 108, girls 115, a total of 223 children, for whom foster homes were found in the eight years of its existence. What this may have meant to the moral elevation of the community it is hard to estimate. There were 21 applications for children referred to as having been found alone within the year, 13 children were found in homes, but who had been taken back to the shelter for one reason or another. There were 15 applications for children received during the year, and 455 received since the organization of the society. The board of the society held on Oct. 10, 1901, a special meeting, and the finance committee three meetings during the year. In all there were 52 children cared for in the shelter during the year from Nov. 1, 1900, to Oct. 31, 1901. Of these 14 were in two, 13 in three, and one was in four times, making in all 73 who were dealt with in the shelter during that period.
