THE PATRIOTIC FUND

Increased by Donation of \$1,500 From Empire League in Old London.

Ottawa, July 9.—The Canadian Patriotic Fund Association have received a further grant of \$1,500 from the British Empire League headquarters in London, in aid of the widows and orphans of members of the Canadian South African contingents and of men incapacitated through wounds sustained in the late war.

ELECTION PETITIONS

Mr. Mincampbell's Election in Sault Ste. Marie Protested.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., July 8.—A petition was entered today against the return of Mr. Andrew Mincampbell, the Conservative member elected at the late election in the riding of Sault Ste. Marie. The petitioner is Mr. C. N. Smith, the defeated Liberal candidate, who charges bribery and corruption against Mr. Mincampbell and his agents. The petition was filed with Crown Attorney Kehoe, Clerk of the Peace, on account of the office of the local Registrar being vacant through the recent death of Dr. Farwell.

PROTESTS DROPPED.

The protest against the return of Mr. Kribs, the Conservative member-elect in South Waterloo, has been dropped.

The money in the protest in South Wellington, where Mr. Downey was elected in the Conservative interest, should have been in yesterday morning, but was not received. The protests in Lincoln against Jessop and in North Waterloo against Lackner were filed yesterday.

NORTH GREY.

The cross-appeal in North Grey was brought to the attention of Mr. Justice Maclellan by Mr. Watson. By the result of the appeal Mr. G. M. Boyd, the Conservative candidate, Mr. A. G. McKay, the Liberal member-elect, was confirmed in his seat by a majority of two.

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LORD KITCHENER'S RECEPTION
EXPECTED TO BE ON JULY 12

The Commander-in-Chief Will Have a Welcome Like the One That Was Given Lord Roberts.

Preliminary Reception Awaits Him at Southampton.

LUNCH AT ST. JAMES' PALACE

Will Be Entertained by the Prince of Wales on Behalf of the King—Hero of the Hour.

The King's Progress.

London, July 9.—Following is the bulletin posted at Buckingham Palace regarding King Edward's condition at 10 o'clock this morning: "The King's progress is uninterrupted. His Majesty sleeps well, and is gaining strength. The wound is slowly healing." (Signed) Treves, Laking, Barlow.

London, July 9.—The programme for the reception of Lord Kitchener upon his arrival from South Africa is similar to the one carried out upon the occasion of the homecoming of Lord Roberts, the commander-in-chief of the forces.

After his elaborate welcome at Southampton, Lord Kitchener is expected to reach London at noon, July 12. He will be escorted to St. James' Palace, where he will be entertained at luncheon by the Prince of Wales.

The Prince will act for the King, and it is said that His Majesty, were it not for his illness, would have honored Lord Kitchener by entertaining him at luncheon, as he did Lord Roberts when the latter returned.

The resolution adopted by the London County Council to tender Lord Kitchener the congratulations of London upon the successful termination of the South African war was opposed by labor members of the council and by Lord Russell (Liberal), who remarked that he could not forget or forgive the judicial murder of Commander Scheepers. The resolution was passed with only a dozen dissenting votes.

50,000 TROOPS TO REMAIN.

The Daily Mail this morning says the permanent garrison in South Africa is to be 50,000 men, under the command of General Lyttonell.

Besides this force the system of having a large number of reservists scattered throughout the country, either on farms or in official positions, will be extensively followed. The reservists could be called upon for service in case of an emergency.

BLOODHOUNDS AND INDIANS

Fail to Successfully Trace the Outlaw Tracy.

SEATTLE SHERIFF GIVES UP

For the Fourth Time the Desperado Fails His Pursuers Who Had Him Surrounded.

Seattle, July 8.—Outlaw Tracy's boat, in which he escaped from Port Madison Saturday night, has been found at the head of Miller's Bay. An Indian squaw claims to have seen the convict, and Sheriff Cook, of Port Madison, has left for the scene with a posse. Cook followed what are alleged to be Tracy's tracks into the forest.

Sheriff Cuddehe, of Seattle, gave up the chase yesterday after pursuing Tracy 125 miles up the sound in his electric tug.

Forty Indians are watching for the fugitive in Kitsap county, and the coast of the lower sound is being patrolled.

The bloodhounds from the Walla Walla penitentiary, arrived at Seattle last night. They came too late to be taken to Port Madison as first intended. Unless Tracy appears again in Kitsap county the hounds will not be taken across the sound.

Beyond guarding the different points threatened by Tracy and waiting for his next appearance, the authorities of the different counties on the sound have no definite plans. They are running each report down and looking for facts.

GOT AWAY AGAIN.

Seattle, Wash., July 9.—Harry Tracy, the fugitive convict outlaw, has for the fourth time since his arrival at Meadow Point escaped from the officers.

Tracy was definitely located in the home of Charles Gerrels, one mile north of the town of Renton, at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. At 4 o'clock Sheriff Cook arrived with a fraction of the posse, and advanced up the track towards the Gerrels' home. The convict, however, plunged into the bush, and was soon lost to view.

When Tracy disappeared from the Gerrels' home, the bloodhounds were hastily brought up from the rear, and dogs struck the trail down the stream, following it for a quarter of a mile and crossing the track only to double back and swim the river. Half way between Cedar River and Burrough's househouse both dogs ran into cayenne pepper sprinkled in the outlaw's retreating footsteps. Their nostrils were filled with the fiery substance, and fully ten minutes were
