GRAIN IN HANDS OF AMERICAN FARMERS

Official Report of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Washington, D. C., March 10.—The agricultural department this afternoon issued the following crop report:
Until the publication of the census figures of acreage, based on a farm canvass, admit of the making of necessary adjustments in the acreage figures of this department, no quantitative estimate of the amount of grain remaining in the hands of farmers on March 1 will be made by the statisticians. Reports received from the department's correspondents, however, indicate that about 23 per cent of last year's wheat crop is still in farmers' hands, as compared with 24.5 per cent, 1909 on hand, March 1, 1901, and 29 per cent, 1899 on hand, March 1, 1906.
The corn in farmers' hands is estimated at about 29 per cent of last year's crop, against 35.9 per cent, 1909 on hand, March 1, 1901, and 36.5 per cent, 1909 on hand, March 1, 1906.
While, as stated above, and more fully explained in connection with other official reports, no definite quantitative estimates of grain production in 1901 will be made public at present, the reports received by the department make it manifest that the wheat crop of that year was one of the largest ever grown; that the corn crop was the smallest, with one exception, in years, and that the oat crop was also much below the average.
This conspicuous departure from the ordinary relation of production of the three principal grains appears to have been followed by a use of wheat as feed for animals more extensively, geographically, if not in actual volume, than has ever before occurred.

TRAMP BOY REVISITS HER AS A PREACHER

The Woman Who Was the Means of His Conversion Years Ago Entertains Him.

Kokomo, Ind., March 11.—The scriptural injunction, "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares" has been verified in the case of Rev. Rachael Middleton, of this city, and a poor ragged tramp.
Fifteen years ago a lad sixteen years of age knocked at her door and asked for food and shelter. She gave him both. She became deeply interested in the boy, who told her he had run away from a good Presbyterian home at Zanesville, Ohio. He gave his name as George Miller. He remained at the home of Mrs. Middleton for some weeks, attending a revival meeting at the Friends' Church and was converted. Then he told Mrs. Middleton that he had told her a falsehood regarding his name—that his true name was Audler Larzelene. He soon left the home of the kind-hearted Quakeress, and for fifteen years he had not been heard of.
A well-dressed man in the garb of a clergyman called at the home of Mr. Middleton this week and introduced himself as Rev. Audler Larzelene, of Canada. It proved to be the return of the tramp of fifteen years ago. After his conversion the young man went to Canada, worked his way through a theological school, and became a leading minister in the Friends' Society. The boy and Sunday were quarterly meetings in the old church at Russiaville, and Rev. Mr. Larzelene preached two profound sermons, which created a great sensation in the neighborhood, and which he came as a ragged tramp fifteen years ago.
He will be the guest for several days of the good woman who turned the course of his life.

ICED MAMMOTH

Has Been Preserved for 2,000 Years—Had 19 Inches of Tongue.

St. Petersburg, March 11.—Cable dispatches from this city have already told of Dr. Herz's discovery of a mammoth preserved in the ice of Eastern Siberia. Dr. Herz now says he discovered it on Sept. 22 near the River Ebrovskia, at the foot of a declivity just over a hundred feet above the water. It was lying down with its feet curiously bent under its body. Dr. Herz concludes that it had fallen down from high ground, and had been instantly killed, as its neck was broken. There was grass in its mouth and food in its stomach. The fall must have happened 2,000 years ago.
When Dr. Herz's party began the work of excavation the cold was such that a shed had to be erected. A fortnight was occupied in thawing out the monster. Meanwhile the stench was such that the mammoth had to be cut out and refrigerated elsewhere. Eventually the huge animal was found complete, save a small piece of the back and half the trunk, which had been eaten by wolves. The mammoth was covered by a coat of rather thick brown hair.
The return journey, 3,000 miles to

Irkutsk, commenced on Oct. 23. The distance was covered on skates, the mammoth having been dissected for convenience in transportation.
The tongue of the mammoth is 19 inches long, and the tail with the hair on it is more than 14 inches long.

STOCK GAMBLING IN MONTREAL.
Montreal, March 11.—The industrial stock boom here has become a game, and every day is a day of the real estate and mining booms of unhappy memory. The transactions on the stock exchange today numbered 313, a record, the highest number since being 282. Some of the orders were for very large blocks of stock, one of 1,000 shares of Dominion Coal being put through, involving \$100,000. The market is not from the big purchasers, however, but from the people, who know nothing of trading—messenger boys, girls, stenographers, small storekeepers and clerks. The brokers are beginning to take the alarm, and high margins are demanded from the new comers.

SMALLPOX AT A WEDDING

Bride Afflicted and Four More in Hospital.

Pest House Inmates Give a Cottillion—The Disease in Ontario Is Not Gaining Ground.

New York, March 10.—The World says: Five persons who participated a month ago in wedding festivities in Roseville, N. J., including the bride, have since been stricken with smallpox and taken to the Newark Isolation Hospital.
The bride, Miss Elfrida M. Lawson, at the time of her marriage to John C. Chapman, was developing the disease, and a few days later was taken to the hospital.
Mrs. Elizabeth Walsh, a sister of the bride, was the next stricken. Clara Ritchie, a four-year-old niece of the bridegroom, followed, and yesterday Mrs. Joseph Kehoe, an aunt of the bridegroom, and Mrs. Kehoe, her daughter-in-law, were received at the Isolation Hospital.
The health authorities believe all the five cases are the result of the unexpected case of the bride.

DANCE AT THE PEST-HOUSE.
The inmates of the Isolation Hospital in Bloomfield, N. J., gave the first of a series of dances Thursday night. Invitations were sent to other patients who occupy the old town house near by, but as they can be fed and strengthened by digested and assimilated food, the cottillion was led by Romeo Love, and Miss Eliza Lewis, who is ill with smallpox. Jacob Werts, who is an inmate, led the orchestra.
The second dance will be given in the near future, to which the members of the town council and board of health will receive invitations. A cake-walk will be a feature, and all the inmates have signified their intention of entering the contest. Health Officer Seymour P. Gilbert will be asked to act as referee.

MOTHER GOES WITH CHILDREN.
When Robert Metcalf, forty-eight years old, of Kearny, N. J., who was a smallpox patient at the Hudson County Isolation Hospital, was discharged from that institution yesterday, he found that his children—Jennie, seven; Grace, four; and Sarah, three—had contracted the disease. The children were removed to the County Hospital. Mrs. Metcalf refused to be separated from her little ones and accompanied them to the hospital.

TWENTY-ONE NEW CASES.
Twenty-one new cases of smallpox and three deaths were reported to the board of health yesterday.

ON SHIPBOARD.
St. John, N. B., March 11.—The Beaver Line steamer Michigan arrived Sunday morning from the Tyne on her maiden voyage. She sailed Feb. 22 for St. John and coasted at Barry. Two cases of smallpox were aboard. They were taken to the hospital at Partridge Island and the ship was thoroughly fumigated and disinfected.

IN ONTARIO—NOT GAINING.
Toronto, March 10.—The smallpox epidemic is not gaining ground very rapidly, if the statistics being sent in to the provincial board of health are any criterion. Comparatively few new cases were reported today. Bathurst township has two additional patients; West Meath one, and Carleton, in Halton, three. The authorities believe there are a number of suspects near Kilsley, which will make an investigation at once.

VACCINATING STUDENTS.
A staff of some twenty doctors began this afternoon to vaccinate all the students at the university as a precaution against the spread of smallpox. They had the movements of Ernest Simpson, who is now at the Swiss hospital. All the students of the affiliated colleges come under the smallpox order. They are to be vaccinated either by the girls' stenographers, small storekeepers and clerks. The brokers are beginning to take the alarm, and high margins are demanded from the new comers.

THE SHANTY MEN.
Ottawa, March 10.—Dr. Bryce, secretary of the provincial board of health, has written to Dr. Law, city health officer, stating that the provincial authorities of Quebec will co-operate with those of Ontario in dealing with shanty men leaving the infected lumber camps in the spring. The city authorities had been told that when the camps broke up there would be an influx of smallpox infected patients, especially from Quebec, back to Ottawa, where hundreds of them are being treated. It is to be established in each of the camps, and only those able to pass the officers appointed by the provincial boards will be allowed to come down.

C. P. R. ENTERPRISE.
Montreal, March 10.—The C. P. R. has given orders for a large addition to its rolling stock during the present year. The order includes 177 locomotives, 1,350 box cars, 719 flat cars, 300 coal cars, 58 standard vans, 207 stock cars and 50 refrigerators. Some of the freight cars will be built at the various C. P. R. shops—Farnham, Perth and other points. The remainder of the new rolling stock, with the exception of 40 box cars, for which an order has been given to the Rhodes-Currie Company of Alton, N. S., will be constructed at the company's own shops in this city.

W. E. AND L. S. ELECTRIC ROAD.
Windsor, March 11.—The Windsor, Essex and Lake Shore Electric Road way wishes exemption from taxation for twenty years. J. A. Nelles, who addressed the aldermen last night, asked for a route from the center of the city along Pitt street, south of Glenora avenue, making exit to Howard street, the parallel to the M. C. R. tracks to Malden; to Essex, by way of the Talbot road; thence to Cottam, to Kingsville, and along the Front road to Leamington. A committee, consisting of A. Bartlett, Leggett, Gagnier, Brooks, Banwell, Calder and Bedford have been appointed to report in two weeks.

MARRIAGE FAILURES

2,396 Divorces Were Granted in Michigan During 1901.

Lansing, Mich., March 11.—Secretary of State Warner has compiled divorce statistics for the last calendar year, which are complete with the exception of Eaton county. There were 2,396 divorces granted in 1901; 45 applications refused, and 250 withdrawn. At the beginning of the year, there were 3,851 bills for divorce pending. Bills filed numbered 2,796, and bills pending at the close of the year, 4,931. During the previous year, 2,435 divorces were granted, last year showing a slight decrease.
