WARRANT OUT
FOR B. O. LOTTCalled as Witness Today, But
Fails to Turn Up.

HIS CASE POSTPONED FOR WEEK

Brenner Denies That Lott Stated
That Cabinet Ministers Had
Promised Protection.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Belleville, Ont., Nov. 26. — A second search is being made for Byron Lott, in his absence his case going over for a week. He was wanted as a witness in the Lott case, but he did not appear. He was not on hand this morning and a warrant was issued.

John Brenner, of Bancroft, publisher of the North Hastings Reporter, went into the witness box and swore that Samuel Hareyett, police magistrate at Bancroft, had told him that a box would come to the postoffice for him (Hareyett). The boxes arrived on Oct. 29. Hareyett was a Liberal worker, and as a cattle dealer was often away, so that having the parcel sent in care of Brenner did not excite the latter's suspicions. Brenner did not know what was in the parcel till later, when Hareyett told him it contained ballot boxes for the election. Hareyett wanted Brenner to take the boxes back and hide them in his attic. Brenner refused, and then Hareyett suggested Patrick Moore, who had been a D. R. O. at the election. Brenner declined to have anything more to do with it. The boxes afterwards disappeared, but he did not know where they went.

Brenner gave the details of a conference with Lott, Hareyett, and Geo. Weese in the Somerset House, Toronto, during the Liberal convention. Weese was a Bancroft hotel-keeper, and had acted as D. R. O. Lott of Weese advised him to say nothing of what he knew. They told him he could in taking the oath, kiss his thumb, and say, "I will not." Brenner denied that Lott or either of the others had told of visiting James Vance or three cabinet ministers, and of being promised protection.

The next witness was Archibald Forsyth, telegraph operator at Harrow, who produced telegrams that passed between Lott and Lott, arranged for meetings. He knew of no messages from Lott or Shibley to James Vance, but promised to look again.

Karl Taylor, a Sydneyham mail carrier, was questioned as to length as to Arden in Kennebec Township just before the election. He denied taking anything out to Arden. He went out in Shibley's interests, but he knew nothing of bogus ballot boxes.

DISCARDED CONFESSION

United States Presbyterian Summary
Breaks With Westminster Creed.

Pittsburg, Nov. 26. — Rev. Dr. David Senley Schaff, professor of church history at the Western Theological Seminary, Allegheny City, today confirmed the report that the Union Theological Seminary, Allegheny City, had discarded the Westminster confession of faith and unanimously adopted a new creed.

Dr. Schaff, who recently returned from New York, said the action was taken last week when the board of directors received two gifts of \$125,000 each. The Westminster confession of faith, he said, was a part of the charter of the seminary, and the members of the board had been obliged to sign the charter. Sentiment had been growing against the confession and the break was finally made last week.

JAPS BECOME CANUCKS

Will Take Up Agricultural Pursuits
in the Territories.

Ottawa, Nov. 26. — The Japanese in the Province of British Columbia will migrate en masse to the Northwest Territories of Canada, it is reported. This report came from the west a short time ago, and it is now confirmed by the consul-general for Japan at Vancouver, Mr. Nisse, from whom the following particulars have been obtained.

There are about 3,600 Japanese in British Columbia, and they have all become naturalized citizens of Canada. They have the same rights in this country as are enjoyed by the native-born. The Japanese, it seems, are not popular in British Columbia. In the minds of the people of the Pacific Province the Japanese are classed with the Chinese, who are cordially hated there, and are consequently hampered and restricted in every possible way.

The Japanese residents of British Columbia have been thrifty and have made money out of market gardening, fishing, factory working and similar pursuits. Now having canvassed the whole situation there and the limited prospects of success before them, they have decided that the exhibits will be out of the exposition grounds by the first of March.

It will have a department of research, and the bacteriology of the soil will be one of the chief lines of research. There will be a department of instruction for young and old who attend the institution. There will be a department of research in construction on economic and profit-making on the farms. Professor Robertson will continue to make Ottawa his home.

FIRE DESTROYS CHURCH

Nothing Left But the Walls of a
\$90,000 Edifice.

Brantford, Ont., Nov. 26. — St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church, one of the most costly in the state, and dedicated less than a year ago, was totally destroyed by fire last night. The loss is estimated at \$90,000. Nothing remains but four black walls.

The flames doubtless started from crossed electric wires, and were discovered about midnight near the roof of the building. The fire was fanned by a violent wind, and the efforts to check it were in vain.

MADE-UP WORDS

DO NOT SUCCEED

Americans Object to Calling
U. S. "Usona."

SUGGESTED BY SIR E. CLARKE

Hon. Mr. Morley Tells New Yorkers
It Could Be Used to Good
Purpose in Cable Code.

New York, Nov. 26. — In several quarters yesterday, says the Herald, there was protest against the proposed use of the term, "Usona," as applied to the United States, at the annual dinner of the American Society in London on Monday night by Sir Edward Clarke.

"Usonia" is the way that the Right Hon. John Morley, member of the British Parliament, jocularly pronounced the name at a dinner given for him by the Lotus Club last evening. He expected Mr. Frank Lawrence, president of the club, who referred to the new title as "Usona."

Mr. Morley was asked later for his personal opinion of the proposed word. He replied: "Well, it seems to me that 'Usona' is more a code word for cable purposes. That anything, however, you may call it yourselves 'what you will,' as Macaulay would say. It would certainly seem to me that it is rather late to begin to use another name."

"It is better to keep on calling yourselves as you have done, I said when I came over here," said the Cetera, "but I had no opinion to express on anything American."

A Chicago dispatch to the Herald says: "University presidents of this country who are gathered here do not think much of the contention of Sir Edward Clarke."

Dr. Eliot, president of Harvard, said: "I think it is a question of usage, and it is for the foreign names to settle themselves. They have helped to establish the custom by referring to the ambassador from this country as the 'American ambassador.'"

Dr. Hadley, president of Yale, said: "It seems to me the usage simply justifies us in our use of the word 'Usona.' For the suggestion that 'Usona' should replace 'America,' and 'Usonian' replace 'American,' we all know that made-up words do not succeed."

END OF WORLD'S FAIR

The Exhibits Will Begin to Move Out
on December 1.

St. Louis, Nov. 26. — Promptly at midnight, Dec. 1, a force of 75 men employed by the General Services Commission, will shut 200 freight cars loaded with empty packing cases into the several exhibit places and the work of dismantling the World's Fair will begin.

Placed at different parts of the exposition grounds are 1,500 carloads of empty packing cases, while outside the grounds are others, aggregating 100 carloads more. These will be distributed as rapidly as possible, and the packing of the exhibits will be rushed.

At daylight on Dec. 2 large forces of men will be sent out to the grounds that conceal the tracks about the exposition grounds. They also will tear up the switches in the rear of the Station, and lay tracks connecting the main line with each of the exhibition buildings. A bond has been filed with the United States Government, through the treasury department, by the World's Fair Terminal Railway, making it a common carrier, which will facilitate the removal of the exhibits as freight cars can be dispatched direct from the exposition grounds to their destinations.

P. E. Phemmer, of Seattle, has been appointed general superintendent of the General Service Company, and declares that the exhibits will be out of the exposition grounds by the first of March.

REILLY TELLS OF
BALLOT BOX PLOTSays It Was Engineered by
Shibley and B. O. Lott.

BOXES MADE AT WATERTOWN

Refused Financial Inducements to
Leave the Country—Some Boxes
Were Sunk in the River.

Toronto, Nov. 26. — The revelations in the bogus ballot box case at Belleville yesterday were of a sensational character, disclosing the origin of the scheme to use bogus ballot boxes, and the various steps in the conspiracy to defraud the electors of their right to vote at the polls who shall represent them in Parliament. The chief witness was Frank J. Reilly, the young Kingston teacher, who created a decidedly favorable impression by his demeanor in the box and the frank way in which he told his story. According to his evidence, W. J. Shibley, the Liberal candidate for Frontenac, originated the plot, having received the idea from a traveler from the Southern States.

Reilly made a clean breast of his connection with the affair, and told how, nearly three years ago, he was persuaded by Mr. Shibley to obtain the loan of a ballot box from the deputy sheriff, without knowing the object for which it was required.

Some time during July or August last he was again approached by Mr. Shibley, who revealed to him that there was a great scheme on foot in connection with the elections, and took him to a tinsmith's shop in Watertown, New York, where he was shown a bogus ballot box in process of manufacture. He subsequently acted as intermediary between Mr. Shibley and the manufacturer, and through Mr. Whalen, of Prescott, an innocent party, for the shipment of the boxes to Philip A. Lott, John Brenner and W. A. Kerfoot, the latter a fictitious person.

The conspiracy was then carried out by Byron O. Lott, and his visit to Watertown—where, after an inspection of the box, he asked that the secret receipt for the bogus ballot be enlarged. He had to overcome a serious majority in the large adverse majority—were also related by Mr. Reilly. He admitted that when he realized that the apparently innocent project undertaken at first as a personal favor to an old friend was leading him into what was becoming a serious position, he endeavored to protect himself from the consequence which would follow exposure. He resisted the suggestions of Mr. Lott, and his visit to Watertown, and declined to leave the country, and declined to exonerate himself as he desired.

He gave emphatic denials to Philip Lott's evidence in several important particulars, especially swearing that the assertion that he had been given regarding the use of a bogus ballot box in one poll in Frontenac County, E. G. Rutan, whose name has frequently figured in the case, and who was placed under arrest yesterday afternoon upon the charge of conspiracy, furnished the link establishing the connection of Mr. Shibley with the conspiracy. At Shibley's instructions he took the boxes containing the bogus ballots to his home, where Shibley showed him the boxes. Subsequently, at Shibley's request, he assisted another man on the night of November 4 to throw the bogus boxes into the lake. This witness was, however, of the opinion that the boxes had not been used. Mr. Lott's connection with the case was further shown by his financial agent, who, at his request, sent a check for \$50 to Mr. Shibley. The case is to be continued today.

FOREIGNERS RIOT

AT WINNIPEG

A Youth Pummelled to Death
and a Lively Stable
Wrecked.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 26. — A serious riot broke out in the city of Winnipeg, 200 Russian factions, occurred on Austin street last night, with the result that Policeman McDonald came within an ace of being stabbed. Antoine Doucker, a youth, was pummelled to death, and Sylvester's lively stable badly wrecked. The trouble started when young Doucker, a Buckowinian, was interrupted by a crowd of Gailians, while running an errand. Doucker, for a time a wild state of affairs prevailed. Finally a strong posse of policemen appeared on the scene, and after some trouble eight of the ring-leaders were arrested.

CHINESE IN GUN PLAY

Fifty Pistol Shots Exchanged in the
New York Bowery District.

New York, Nov. 26. — Fully fifty pistol shots were exchanged in the Bowery last night between eight or ten Chinese and a number of white men, one probably fatally. The police do not know the exact number of persons engaged, but the shooting was so fast and loud that passers-by and policemen thought at first the noise was made by firecrackers. The shooting was between members of the Hip Sing Tong, a reform organization, and members of the On Leong Tong, a Chinese secret society, which is reputed to foster opium traffic. None of the Chinese was hurt, but John Baldwin received a bullet in his abdomen which will likely cause death, and Horace Laudi was shot in the hip. Several Chinese were arrested.

The walls are left standing, though badly scorched. Several thousand bushels of grain also were destroyed, but it is fully covered by insurance. The loss was \$2,000. PARENT MAKES

A CLEAN SWEEP

Only Six Conservatives in
the Quebec House.

MINISTER GUERIN DEFEATED

Rainsville Loses in Montreal—Labor
Party Fails to Elect a
Candidate.

Montreal, Nov. 26. — Having thirty-five supporters by acclamation to start with, Premier Parent, as a result of the elections yesterday in 37 constituencies, will open the Quebec Legislature with a straight Opposition of only six.

The Liberals practically swept the entire Province, and the only Conservative who were successful were Hon. P. E. LeBlanc in Laval, J. N. Teller in Joliette, L. P. Bernard in Sherbrooke, G. Girard in Compton, G. M. Laframboise in St. John's, and J. Lemay in L'Orignal.

In the last Parliament the Opposition had seven members. The leader, owing to the outbreak of this anti-constitutional result of the elections, had to nominate candidates, but thirteen straight party candidates were brought out.

The results gave 42 Liberals, 6 Conservatives, 4 Independent Liberals, and 2 elections to be held—Gaspé and Magdalen.

The campaign was carried on without any real issue. In a few constituencies, particularly St. Louis division of Montreal, a battle was made of the Liberal and anti-constitutionalist, the Montreal Street Railway Company, etc., under the name of trusts and monopolies, Godfroy Langlois, who has frequently figured in the case, and who was placed under arrest yesterday afternoon upon the charge of conspiracy, furnished the link establishing the connection of Mr. Shibley with the conspiracy. SEARCHING FOR
J. MORGAN SMITHPolice Think His Evidence
Would Convict Actress.

HANSOME CAB CASE RESUMED

Prosecution Seeking the Man Who
Bought Revolver That Killed
the Bookmaker.

New York, Nov. 26. — After a respite of two days on account of the Thanksgiving holiday, the trial of Nan Patterson, for the murder of Caesar Young, was continued today before Justice Davis and a jury in the criminal branch of the supreme court. Although the members of the jury and the defendant gave themselves over to rest during the interval afforded by the recess, the attorneys in the case took advantage of the intermission to bring closer together the material points upon which depends the success of their case. Rumor, which has figured prominently in the case since the trial began, also was active during the interval. One of the stories which gained wide circulation, and which, if true, undoubtedly would have added materially to the sensational side of the trial, was to the effect that J. Morgan Smith, Nan Patterson's brother-in-law, who fled after he had been subpoenaed before the grand jury, had been found and was locked up at police headquarters. This report was denied later by the police, however. The prosecution has kept up an unrelenting search for Smith ever since he disappeared. They charge that it was Smith who purchased the revolver with which Young was shot, and that he would prove to be their strongest witness if he could be found. Already, Smith's photograph has been introduced in the case and identified, and the prosecution has promised that the paymaster who sold the revolver will also identify the photograph as that of the man who purchased the weapon.

HEINRICH IBSEN DYING

Little Hope of Recovery of Great
Scandinavian Dramatist.

London, Nov. 26. — Heinrich Ibsen, the author, according to a dispatch from Stockholm to the Chronicle, has had several attacks of heart trouble. His condition is dangerous, and there is little hope of his recovery, although he was somewhat better on Thursday.

GALLANTRY COST LIFE

Long Overcoat Caught and Dragged
Man Beneath Wheels.

Erie, Pa., Nov. 26. — Gallantry to a young lady whom he was seeing off on the train cost the life of Park Ross, aged 21 years, at the small way-station of Springfield on the Bessemer Railroad, south of here, late Tuesday night. Ross wore a long overcoat. He helped the girl on the train and stood by the car talking to her. As the train started his coat caught and he could not unloosen himself before he had been thrown under the wheels. The girl thought he had turned away and no one else saw or heard him in the darkness.

Some minutes later a man passing the scene called out, "For God's sake help me, I am bleeding to death." He died two hours later.

The young woman was prostrated when she heard the news, as was the boy's widowed mother, of whom he was the only support.

HORSE NEARLY

SPLIT MINISTRY

Hans, the Equine Calculator,
Upsets Prussian Political
Circles.

New York, Nov. 26. — A Berlin dispatch to the Times says, Hans Herr Von Osten's extraordinary Orloff stallion, has become a political issue in Prussia. Several members of the Diet are highly incensed on account of the enthusiasm which Dr. Studt, the minister of education, displayed over the animal's powers, and he will be questioned in the House regarding the matter. An interesting debate is expected. It is even said that Hans nearly caused a split in the ministry. The story goes that Dr. Studt wanted the animal to display his powers before Emperor William, and that the other ministers strongly opposed it. Thereupon it is asserted Dr. Studt threatened to resign. It is said that the dispute was smoothed over at the time being, but is likely to come up again.
