#### United States Presbyterian Summary Breaks With Westminster Creed.

Pittsburg, Nov. 26. - Rev. Dr. David Schley Schaff, professor of church history at the Western Theological Seminary, Allegheny City, today confirmed the report that the Union Theological Seminary of New York had discarded the Westminster confession of faith and unanimously adopted a new creed.

Dr. Schaff, who recently returned from New York, said the action was taken last week when the board of directors received two gifts of \$125,000 The Westminster confession of faith, he said, was a part of the charter of the seminary, and the members of the board had been obliged to sign the charter. ## THIRD ATTACK ON LONE TREE HILL
