A very stubborn fire did nearly \$70,000 damage on Saturday evening to the warehouse of Forsythe, Fraser & Weir; to the plant of H. T. Reason Co., and to the warehouse of Mc-Mahen & Granger. The whole block was threatened at one time, and it ooked as if a very serious fire would

After nearly 7 hours' hard work in zero weather, the brigade finally got

the best of the flames. Two firemen were injured, Captain John Mitchell of No. 5 company had his ankle sprained, and Fireman Bryan of the central station had one hand crushed under a ladder. Neither ac-cident is serious, but it will lay both men up for a few days.

#### DISCOVERY OF THE FIRE.

The fire was discovered by Mr. Archie McMahen. He was in the warehouse of McMahen & Granger, and noticing a light at the rear, he went back to investigate. At that moment the flames burst out of the rear of Forsythe, Fraser & Weir's establish-Fire Chief Aitken had noticed a bright light at the rear of the block, was about to investigate when the alarm was turned in. All the departments in the city responded, and was not long before the whole brigade was at work.

When the firemen started work, the whole rear of the building was ablaze. Fire was present on every floor. Six streams were thrown in from the rear, and many were thrown in from the front.

#### STUBBORN FIGHT.

The fight looked to be a stubborn one, and the brigade settled down for a long, hard battle. The steam engine, was placed in

commission, and soon threw two large streams in the front. The aerial truck was arranged, and the firemen got a large stream on the top floors.
